### **Thinking About Lent**

The Very Reverend Kenneth Swanson, Ph.D. Dean and Rector

In some ways Lent is

analogous to what we feel in those times when God is silent. We people of faith don't know exactly what to call it: "Darkness;" "Absence;" "Desert;" "Wilderness;" "Cloud of Unknowing;" or "Night." But all who have walked with God, all who in great thirst have drunk deeply from the love of God, all who battered by the seeming vagaries of life who have been soothed by the balm of Gilead, in other words all people of sincere faith have known it.

The one who created and sustains us, the one who gives us the wisdom and courage to face anything, the one in whom our well being and identity rest, is gone.

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And we are left, alone, terrifyingly alone. The prophets knew it. Jeremiah wrote, "He has made my teeth grind on gravel; and made me cower in ashes; my soul is bereft of peace; I have forgotten what happiness is... Is there any sorrow like my sorrow?"

The Psalmist knew it: "I am poured out like water, and all my bones are out of joint; my heart is like wax; it is melted within my breast; my mouth is dried up like a potsherd, and my tongue sticks to my jaws; you lay me in the dust of death."

Even his own Son, the one he himself declared was beloved, knew it. Jesus, baptized, came up out of the water to those blessed words, and was immediately driven into the wilderness, into darkness, into night, into silence, only silence from his loving Father. Forty days. Forty nights. Alone, abandoned, alone with only temptation as his company. But in that silence, resisting temptation, he discovered his true identity. In that darkness, he was able to look beyond, look through to the light of redemption. In that absence, in that desert, he discovered how he was to live, how he was to die, and how he would live again. He knew. Creation itself knew. The heavenly host knew. For at the end, when the silence was over, when the darkness retreated before the light, when the desert bloomed, he was with the wild beasts and angels waited on him. Creation itself knew. The heavenly host knew. Only humanity did not yet know.

So my sisters and brothers, I invite you to a holy Lent. And if you choose to enter the silence, the darkness by intentionally fasting, or if you simply find yourself overwhelmed in what feels like a desert, remember that even there we are not abandoned. Even there we are not alone. For wherever we may wander, Jesus has been there before, and whether we know or not, he is with us. He is with us, calling out our true identity, allowing us to see the light of his redemption, showing us how we are to live.

"The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness. 'The Lord is my portion,' says my soul, 'therefore I will hope in him.'"



Located on the campus of Coast Episcopal School in Long Beach, MS, Camp Coast Care is a mission point of the Lutheran and Episcopal Disaster Response, funded in large part through Episcopal Relief and Development. On Palm Sunday and Easter Day there will be no Christian Education Classes or Breakfast.

### Services of Holy Week

Holy Week begins on *Palm Sunday* with the Liturgy of the Palms, which celebrates Jesus' entry into Jerusalem. The celebrant gives thanks over the branches, and there is a festive procession with songs of "Hosanna in the highest!" as we enact the event which led directly to Good Friday. The second part of the Palm Sunday liturgy changes from triumph to tragedy as it focuses on the suffering and death of Jesus. The account of the Lord's Passion is read from the Gospel.

**Tenebrae** is the Latin word for "darkness" or "shadows." The most conspicuous feature of the service is the gradual extinguishing of candles and other lights until only a single candle, considered a symbol of our Lord, remains. Toward the end of the service this candle is hidden, typifying the apparent victory of the forces of evil. At the very end, a loud noise is made, symbolizing the earthquake at the time of Christ's death. The hidden candle is restored to its place, and by its light all depart in silence.

*Maundy Thursday* is a celebration of our Lord's institution of the sacrament of his Body and Blood, but it is pervaded by the shadow of the cross. Jesus gathered with his friends in the context of the Passover. It was a farewell dinner in which Jesus, by washing his disciples' feet, sought to illustrate one final time the character of love and ministry which is central in the life to which he calls us. We hear the ancient instructions for celebrating the Passover and Paul's account of the institution of the Eucharist.

On *Good Friday* we hear John's account of the Lord's trial, suffering, and death. We will engage in intense intercessory prayer for the church and for the world. It was on the cross that Jesus made his full intercession for us, and we are united with him through Baptism in that intercession. At the end of the liturgy, the church is left in silence and darkness.

The *Holy Saturday* liturgy recalls Jesus' burial and reminds us that the day is a period of preparation for the great celebration of Easter.

The Great Vigil of Easter is unlike any other service in the year. We celebrate the Passover of Jesus from death into life and our own Passover from death into life in Holy Baptism. The service has four parts. First is the Service of Light, in which the light of Christ is rekindled in the darkness. During the Vigil, we celebrate and make present stories of major events of salvation history. We renew the covenant of our Baptism, and we celebrate the Holy Eucharist. This is the first Eucharist of Easter.



Who is our new bishop? He is the Right Reverend John Crawford Bauerschmidt, the eleventh Bishop of Tennessee elected and duly consecrated to serve as chief pastor for all Episcopalians within the environs of Middle Tennessee.

A native of Columbia, South Carolina,

Bishop Bauerschmidt has degrees from Kenyon College, General Theological Seminary and an earned doctorate from Oxford University. Prior to his election as bishop on October 28, he served a variety of parishes in Massachusetts, North Carolina and Louisiana. Close to our own hearts, he and his wife Caroline have chosen to call Christ Church Cathedral home with their sons aged fifteen and twelve, and a daughter who is nine.

### Christ Church Cathedral Men's Book Discussion Group

This monthly gathering is designed to provide men across Christ Church Cathedral with a time and place for fellowship together and theological reflection. We will convene for dinner and discussion 7–9 p.m. on the second Tuesday of each month at the home of Matthew & Alice Corkern, 210 Woodmont Circle. A spiritual and/or literary work will be chosen in consultation with the group for each succeeding month.

Top Jesus scholars Marcus Borg and John Dominic Crossan join together in The Last Week "to retell a story everyone thinks they know too well and most do not seem to know at all." Consequently, they reveal a radical and little-known Jesus. As both authors reacted to and responded to questions about Mel Gibson's blockbuster The Passion of the Christ, they discovered that many Christians are unclear on the details of events during the week leading up to Jesus's crucifixion. Using the gospel of Mark as their guide, Borg and Crossan present a day-by-day account of Jesus' final week of life. The Jesus introduced by Borg and Crossan is this new moral hero, a more dangerous Jesus than the one enshrined in the church's traditional teachings. Quite impressively, this work demonstrates the redemptive power of Holy Week and calls all readers into a new vision within the midst of Lent. Informed, challenged, and inspired, we not only meet the historical Jesus, but meet a new Jesus who engages us and invites us to follow him.




