

## EDITORIAL ALLIES OF COMMUNISM

The other day I was talking with a gentleman who was very much down on Communism. There was, of course, nothing unusual in this. Nearly all Americans are down on Communism. This gentleman, however, had not a normal case of opposition to Communism, but almost a fanatical one. His main objection to Communism was its opposition to Christianity. "It is atheistic," he said. "It has closed up the Churches. If the Communists had their way there would be no Churches whatever. For this reason I think they are the very worst enemies of the human race."

Being a Clergyman I was quite naturally delighted to find such a staunch advocate of the Churches. I said as much to him. To what Church, I asked, did he happen to belong? Imagine my amazement (and disillusionment) when he admitted that he did not belong to any Church. Not only that, he never attended any Church. He had not been inside a Church for five years. He had not contributed even a dollar to the support of any Church for an even longer period.

I could not resist suggesting to my friend that he was actually in league with the Communists. Yes, he, too, was in the anti-Church crusade. The Communists themselves could not possibly devise any better plan to close up the Churches than he himself was pursuing. He was helping them carry out their aims with a vengeance. If only everyone did as he was doing the Communist anti-religious program would succeed: The Churches would all be closed up speedily. There would be no more religious services conducted, because there would be no congregations.
