

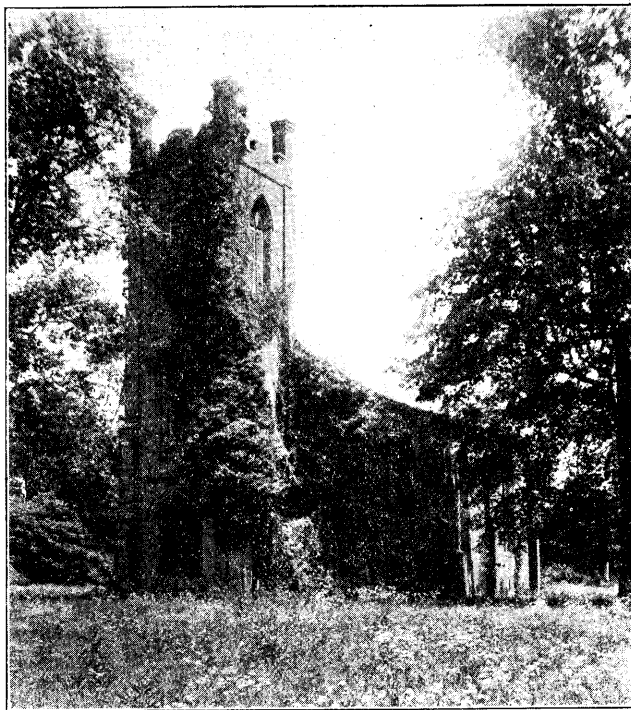

## REV. DAVID ROSE TO PREACH SUNDAY

The Rev. David Rose, former member of Christ Church and now Associate Rector of Christ Church, Pensacola, will conduct the service of Morning Prayer and preach at the eleven o'clock service Sunday. The Rector will be in Chattanooga to give the Baccalaureate sermon for Baylor School.

Mr. Rose is well known, and has many friends in Nashville. It is expected that there will be a large attendance at the service next Sunday. Mr. Rose was baptised, confirmed and ordained in Christ Church. He is a graduate of the University of the South and of Sewanee Seminary. On Friday he will conduct the marriage service for his brother, Mr. Norvell Rose and Miss Emma Connell of Goodlettsville.

Next Sunday, May 26, has been appointed for the annual Ashwood Pilgrimage. Holy Communion will be celebrated and sermon delivered at eleven o'clock by Bishop Maxon in St. John's Church, Ashwood.

## BOOK REVIEW FRIDAY, MAY 31

As announced previously, the Rector will review the Religion of a Healthy Mind by Charles T. Holman, in the parish house, Friday, May 31, at 3:30 p. m. The cost of admission is twenty-five cents. Proceeds from this review will go to the Young People's Service League and will assist them in several of their important projects.

The editorial committee of the Religious Book Club makes this comment on the book: "The central interest is in showing how the harmonious development of personality can be promoted and disintegrating inner conflicts be healed. For this achievement religion is shown to have indispensable resources.

. . . Part one deals with factors that menace mental health; part two, with the way in which Christian faith promotes mental health. The "religion of a healthy mind," means deliverance from self-centeredness through the discovery of a cosmic Purpose in relation to which one becomes a larger self."

Charles T. Holman, English by birth, Canadian by education, American by adoption, is a member of the faculty of the University of Chicago.

1. Which are the Penitential Psalms?
2. Are there any duplicates among the 150 Psalms printed in our Prayer Book?
3. Are there any special peculiarities in the Psalms not evident in the English Edition?
4. What Psalm is an acrostic of the time of the Maccabees?
5. Are any of the Psalms quoted in full anywhere in the Bible outside the Book of Psalms?
6. Which Psalms are used regularly as fixed parts of our service?
7. How many sections has the Book of Psalms?
8. What translation of the Psalms is used in our Prayer Book?
9. How does the Prayer Book intend that the Psalter shall be read?
10. How can you find special selections of Psalms for "Thanksgiving"?

## Answers to Do You Know the Psalms.

1. Psalms 6, 32, 38, 51, (This is the "Miserere"); 102, 130, 143. All of these Psalms give expression to deep penitence.

2. There are several, of which the following is the list. There are other duplications of parts of Psalms too numerous to mention here. Psalms 14 and 53 are identical. Psalms 31: 1-4 is identical with Psalm 71: 1-3. Psalm 40: 17-22 is the entire Psalm 70. Psalm 57: 8-12, and Psalm 60: 5-12 make up the 13 verses of Psalm 108. Psalm 115: 4-8 is the same as Psalm 135: 15-18.

3. Yes. Certain of the Psalms are Acrostics, the first letter (in the original Hebrew) of each verse serving that purpose. Psalm 119 has as many sections as the Hebrew Alphabet, and praises the Law under each letter. Psalms 9 and 10 together make an Alphabetical Psalm, and 25, 34, 37, 111, 112, and 145, are arranged in the same form.

4. Psalm 110, which has the name "Simon" in the first letters of its verses. It corresponds to I Maccabees 2:65-68; 13:8-9, 41; 16:5, 6, and 5:37-43.

5. Yes. For an example see II Samuel 22-2 and following, which is Psalm 18.

6. Venite (a combination of Psalms 95 and 96); Jubilate Deo, Psalm 100; Cantate Domino, Psalm 98; Deus Misereatur, Psalm 67; Bonum est Confiteri, Psalm 92; Benedi Anima mea, Psalm 108; Miserere mei, Deus, Psalm 51. In the Burial of the Dead Psalms 39, 90, 27, 46, 121 and 130 are used. Psalms 23 and 121 are used for the Burial of a Child.

7. Five divided as follows., I, 1-41; II, 42-72; III, 73-89; IV, 90-106; V, 107-150. These divisions will be found to be marked in our Prayer Book as Book I, etc.
