(The following paragraph was written by Betsy Winter and appears in the current number of the Layman's Magazine.)

In The Passing or the Third Floor Back, Jerome K. Jerome paints a picture of a sordid Bloomsbury boarding house to which a Stranger comes. The lives of the inmates of the house are changed and enriched because of the coming of this Traveller. He came not in a cloud of glory, but as a simple everyday individual. And that is how we should think of Him in our own lives. He may come unannounced, but we will know that He has visited the secret places of our mind and soul, and we will feel the difference in our lives which our welcoming of Him has made. If we stop trying so hard to be good and accept Christ as our friend, we will find that if we are sincere we will have received power to help us to become good. To be a friend of Christ is not an easy way, but it is a satisfying way and it isn't lonely for He has walked that way before us and He will walk it still with everyone who is man enough to follow. We may lose all our loved ones-relatives and friends, but if we have accepted Christ as our friend, we will find that we are never again alone, for we have found a Friend who will help us till we die and in death not leave us afraid.

The following interesting article appears in The Episcopal Church Evangelist, and was written by the Rt. Rev. W. Appleton Lawrence, Bishop of Western Massachusetts.

You cannot bounce into the presence of God and seem to say, "Here I am; inspire me!" Yet many people seem to assume that they can, and arrive just as the service starts, or even shortly after. Such people would find it more helpful if they would allow time enough to lay aside the cares and interests of our daily existence.

Another matter which would help is to have everyone join in the saying of the Psalms and the repeating of the "Amens." This certainly helps to keep one's mind alert and attentive. Although we stand when saying the Creed, we sometimes do so in a sloppy way. It ought to be done with the same snap with which a soldier salutes the colors.

Let us try to make our worship more real in these and other ways.
