From the Dean

Dispel the darkness of our hearts, that by your brightness we may know you to be the true God and eternal light, living and reigning for ever and ever. *Amen.*

—*The Book of Common Prayer, 1979, p. 110*

In case you hadn't noticed, I'm a presbyope. It started with a little squinting and progressed until people began to ask if my arms had grown shorter. For some time, vanity trumped honesty in this connection, but no matter how far away I held the can of vegetables at the grocery store, the fine print remained fuzzy.

I knew it was time to see the doctor when one night, out on a parish call, the dome light in my car refused to turn on and the dashboard light was insufficient for reading. I pulled up under a street light but to no avail. Map Quest's directions, the words that held the key to my timely arrival at the parishioner's house, would not give up their secret. Try as I might, the best I could pick up from the sheet were grey smudges, as if someone had dragged an eraser over a penciled phrase.

The ophthalmologist explained that for most people (near-sighted) vision begins to deteriorate between the ages of 40 and 50. But the causes of presbyopia are uncertain. The loss of sharp focus on nearby objects may reflect a loss of elasticity in the crystalline lens or possibly a slackening of the muscles that bend and straighten the lens of the eye (the ciliary muscles).

Knowing the "how" of sight loss is not much comfort. I miss having eyes that don't depend on glasses to focus. It's an aggravation to have to remember one more thing before leaving the house (I have a hard enough time keeping up with car keys). And the glasses themselves are reminders that I'm simply not what I used to be.

Adding insult to injury, one description of presbyopia includes the following sentence: "Like gray hair and wrinkles, presbyopia is a symptom caused by the disease of aging." The disease of aging! Did I need another reminder of how this world is fallen and I am broken?

This year I have a new appreciation for the season of Light, the season of the Epiphany in which the faithful seek illumination through the radiance of Christ's glory (*BCP, p. 215*). More light means more sight. The Sun of Righteousness (*Malachi 4:2*) brings healing in his wings and promises sight to the blind. The brilliance of this Light offers hope that I might see again in spite of the dark night, in spite of failing sight. It renews the possibility that I might not stumble at noon as in the twilight. This Light enables me to keep in view the signposts pointing to the New Jerusalem.

SUMMARY OF VESTRY MINUTES



At the Special Meeting of the Vestry on **Sunday, November 4, 2011**, the Cathedral Vestry

- was called to order in prayer by the Dean.
- approved a designation of the Thanksgiving offering on recommendation of the Community Outreach committee: 1/3 CCC Room in the Inn, 2/3 to the Nashville Key Alliance.

At the regularly scheduled meeting of **Monday, November 21, 2011**, the Cathedral Vestry:

- was called to order in prayer by the Dean.
- received a Canvass report from Tameron Hedge and Sam Bessey.
- Vestry Canvass follow-up calls were distributed.
- approved the 2012 Diocesan budget contribution (\$263,627).
- agreed, as the 2012 budget provides, to hire a full-time Director of Communications, to restore the 10% program cuts of 2010, and to provide a 2% salary raise to the Cathedral staff.
- received a report on the Book Store inventory liquidation.
- received a report from the Communications Committee on the development of a searchable archive for Vestry Minutes back to 1940.
- approved a designation of the Christmas offering: Reconciliation Ministries
- elected delegates and alternate delegates to the Annual Convention of the Diocese of Tennessee.
- received a report from the Finance Committee indicating a year-to-date positive General Fund variance of \$159,000.

At the regularly scheduled meeting of **Monday, December 19, 2011**, the Cathedral Vestry:

- was called to order in prayer by the Dean.
- received a report from the Mission Statement drafting committee.
- appropriated \$3,000 to cover all costs associated with the hosting of Curate Caler's ordination to the priesthood.
- received a report from the Vestry Nominating Committee including names of nominees for the Vestry class of 2015.
- approved resolutions designating Housing exclusions for Cathedral clergy as required by the IRS.
- adopted, provisionally, the 2012 General Fund budget as recommended by the Finance Committee. A balanced budget committee was appointed (The Wardens, the Dean, Ed Burgess (Finance Committee), Mark McQueen (staff consultant), and Scott Viebranz (Vestry)) and charged with the task of creating a balanced budget with pledges received through January 9, 2012.

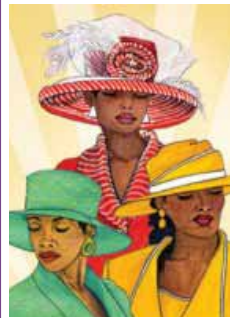

From The Youth Pastor...

What do we usually associate with Lent? Giving something up? Taking on an extra commitment - to good works, prayer, or almsgiving? Whatever comes to mind when we think of Lent, it usually tends to be about something *we do*: giving up sweets or coffee, taking an extra shift at the soup kitchen, saying Morning Prayer more frequently, donating to a favorite charity, and so on.

Sometimes the emphasis is placed so firmly on the things we do during Lent, that we're tempted either to congratulate ourselves when we meet a particular challenge, or to think of ourselves as "failed Christians" if we don't accomplish what we set out to do on Ash Wednesday.

But Lent is not so much about the things we do - as if we could earn God's love through feats of spiritual strength - but about what God can do in us. The practices of self-giving that we take on in Lent are really just an opportunity to carve out a space in our hearts - space that used to belong to television, or shopping, or chocolate, or coffee, or gossip - so that God can fill us with his love. Lent is therefore not primarily about giving something up, but about receiving a gift. Lent is about grace.

One of the constant features of life for young people in our culture is the way in which every move, every word, every article of clothing, every test score, is subject to judgment. School, friends, Facebook, television, sports, even parents, can become a test, a challenge, a proving ground. And everything relies on the young person's own performance. This attitude, carried over into our spiritual lives, can make us think that God is also one of these critics, sitting high in heaven just waiting for us to make a false move.

But God's love for us does not depend upon our performance.

God knows that we make many false moves, many failed attempts. God knows that we "miss the mark" (the ancient phrase for sin) a thousand times a day. And he still loves us.

According to St. Paul, "God proves his love for us in that *while we were still sinners*, Christ died for us" (Rom. 5:8).

This year, let's observe the Lenten season, not as one more opportunity to prove ourselves, but as an opportunity to prove the love of God - a love that is unlimited by our limits.

Do you think anyone is going to be able to drive a wedge between us and Christ's love for us? There is no way! Not trouble, not hard times, not hatred, not hunger, not homelessness, not bullying threats, not backstabbing, not even the worst sins listed in Scripture...None of this fazes us because Jesus loves us. I'm absolutely convinced that nothing—nothing living or dead, angelic or demonic, today or tomorrow, high or low, thinkable or unthinkable—absolutely nothing can get between us and God's love because of the way that Jesus our Master has embraced us.

Ash Wednesday February 22...



Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent, when we begin a time of reflection, self-examination, and spiritual redirection. Lent originated in the very earliest days of the Church as preparation for Easter, when the faithful rededicated themselves and when converts were instructed in the faith and were prepared for baptism. Jesus was sent by the Holy Spirit into the wilderness for forty days to prepare for his ministry. By observing Lent, we join Jesus on his fast in the wilderness as we consider our mortality and dependence on God. During liturgies on **Ash Wednesday at 7 a.m., 12:15 p.m., and 6 p.m.**, the foreheads of worshipers are marked with an ashen cross, because in the Bible a mark on the forehead is a symbol of a person's ownership. Being marked with a cross symbolizes that the person belongs to God. This is in imitation of the spiritual mark that is put on in baptism, when we are "marked as Christ's own forever." The ashes are traditionally made from palm fronds from the previous year's Palm Sunday observance.

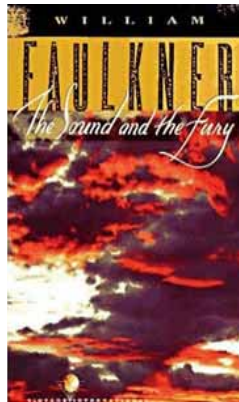

William Faulkner's fourth novel, *The Sound and the Fury*, represents the author's first, true masterpiece, and perhaps his finest work. The novel was Faulkner's favorite creation and described by him as his "most splendid failure" in which he depicts in four movements, presented from the perspectives of four narrators, the decline of the once-aristocratic Compson family. One may argue that *The Sound and the Fury* continues in modified form the tradition of the nineteenth-

century fiction; the novel tells the story of a family over a period of thirty years, following a generation from early childhood through the primary remembered events of their lives to maturity or death. As readers, we enter into the lives of the Compson family from the early 1890s and follow their lives through Good Friday, Holy Saturday, and Easter Sunday of 1928. We shall examine Faulkner's treatment of religious themes in the novel and discuss how the book illustrates the author's interpretation of his role as writer: to present "the old, universal verities and truths of the heart and the problems of the spirit.

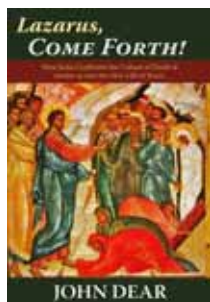
