From the Dean

Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you

1 Thessalonians 5:16-18

Come mid-Lent, you will notice that the Celebrant on Sunday mornings uses a different Proper Preface in the Canon of the Mass. The Proper Preface gives the whole Eucharistic Prayer its seasonal character and focus. Early in Lent we are reminded of the power we are given, as members of Christ's Body, to resist sin and "triumph over evil." The Proper Preface will not let us forget Christ's temptation by Satan in the desert and the utter futility of the Adversary's advance.

But sometime after the Third Sunday in Lent, the Celebrant will use the second of the two Proper Prefaces for Lent in the *Book of Common Prayer* (BCP, p. 379). This preface addresses God the Father and expresses the hope that the People of God will "come to the fullness of grace." Only here the prayer does not bring to mind the Exhortation from the Ash Wednesday Liturgy which emphasizes the observance of a holy Lent. Rather, we are enjoined to "prepare with joy for the Paschal feast."

For those who have experienced Lent—its fasting and call to repentance—as a necessarily forbidding detour in the journey toward the empty tomb, the words "prepare with joy" may seem like a *non sequitur*. For those who would characterize the life of devotion ("fervent in prayer"), the life of service ("and in works of mercy"), the life steeped in the Sacraments ("and renewed by Word and Sacraments"), and the life of purity ("You bid your faithful people cleanse their hearts") as enervating, boring, life-denying, or just no longer relevant to the changing spiritual needs of the modern day Christian, such mention of joy in Lent may seem misplaced.

Nevertheless, the Liturgy sets this joy before us. Although Christ's agony, betrayal, capture, torture, and execution are unmistakable parts of the drama unfolding before us, still joy is to be our vocation. If the Lenten fast of these forty days cuts against the grain of a life conditioned on immediate gratification, comfort, and self-satisfaction, someone is bound to shout, "I find no reason at all to be joyful at this time!"

But the Apostle does call us to rejoice always—in everything, at all times, in the depths of despair, and on the mountaintop of expectation. Joy is to characterize the Christian's walk not only on Easter morning but all along every mile of the pilgrimage to Calvary. Whether we face failure, poverty, hunger, disease, sickness, pain, war, terror, and confusion—our mandate is to rejoice. The power of Christ's passion and resurrection prepares us to rejoice. The power of Christ's passion and resurrection equips us to counter every sign of a fallen creation with the promise of renewal and the hope of salvation.

The second Proper Preface for the season of Lent, again addressed to God, ends by answering the question "why." Why do we keep this fast? Why do we prepare for the Paschal feast? We keep it in order that the baptized "may come to the fullness of grace which you have prepared for those who love you." To journey through Lent to Easter—to walk in joy—is to learn how to love God.

LENT AT THE CATHEDRAL

The Lenten Fast

The Book of Common Prayer identifies all weekdays of Lent and Holy Week as days to be "observed by special acts of discipline and self-denial" (BCP, p. 17), excepting the Feast of the Annunciation (March 25).

This may take the form of a fast from particular foods. Fast from meat, dairy products, sugars, sweets, caffeine, and alcohol have been time-honored across the sweep of Christian history. Bible study, devotion at prayer, almsgiving, and the performing of acts of mercy, are also "special acts of discipline" that the Christian may embrace.

Social events hosted on the campus of Christ Church Cathedral will seek to refrain from serving meat, sweets, and caffeine during the weekdays of Lent.

Reconciliation of a Penitent

Following the form in the Book of Common Prayer called, "Reconciliation of a Penitent", Christ Church Cathedral priests will be available to hear confessions during Lent every Thursday from 11:00 a.m. to 12 noon in the Chapel or by appointment. See page 8 for more information.

Open Doors

A Lenten discipline undertaken by the whole community this year, in the name of hospitality, will see that the doors of the Cathedral at 9th and Broadway be opened to the city between 11:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. Come to pray. Come to watch. Come to read the paper. Come to work on laptop. Whatever you need to bring with you for the time, come and sign up for a one hour watch. The Dean is hopeful that three Cathedral communicants will be present at each hour that we are open.

Lenten Bible Study

Dreams: Listening to God's Voice March 5, 12, & 19 11:00 a.m.

How did/does God speak and reveal himself to his people through dreams? The Reverend Canon Gene Manning will lead a study examining several of the significant dreams described in Holy Scripture. From Abraham to Jacob to the Holy Family what do we learn from these holy intrusions in the middle of the night? The class will meet at 11 a.m. and continuing for three weeks. Childcare is provided.

LITURGICAL NOTES

- ♦ "Solemn" During Holy Week and the month of April you will occasionally find a liturgy posted in the Order of Worship as "Solemn HE". Use of the word "Solemn" before the letters "HE" indicates a sung celebration of the Holy Eucharist accompanied by the use of incense and bells.
- ♦ "Veiling" The practice of veiling visible objects in the Nave, e.g. crosses, icons, statues, carvings, during Lent and/or Holy Week arose in the Medieval English Church for the purpose of encouraging a kind of "visual fast". The refrain from the experience of beauty during Holy Week helped one prepare for, and sharpened the brilliance of, the Paschal Feast.
- ♦ "The Feast of the Annunciation," the day on which the Church celebrates the visit of the Angel Gabriel to the Blessed Mother is a fixed feast day. It always falls on March 25. It is a feast day even if it falls during the 40 days of Lent. *The Book of Common Prayer* further notes that this feast may not take precedence of a Sunday. Therefore, since March 25 falls on a Sunday this year, the church calendar "bumps" (counterintuitively for a fixed feast day) the celebration to the nearest available day: Monday, March 26. Please observe that Monday as a feast day and note that the propers for the noonday Eucharist will be those of the Annunciation.

SUMMARY OF VESTRY MINUTES

At its regularly scheduled meeting of **January 24, 2012,** the Cathedral Vestry:



- received the second interim report of the Vestry Nominating Committee;
- restored \$1,237 to the 2012 Outreach Committee budget so as to prevent and reduction in the funds available for ministry over the previous year's budget. The monies were allocated from the 2011 budget surplus;
- received the report of the *ad hoc* Balance the Budget committee of the Vestry. The 2012 Budget provided for the restoration of numerous program cuts in 2011, for the hire of a new Director of Communications, and for a 2% Cathedral staff salary raise;
- received the report of the Mission Statement drafting committee. Tyler Yarbro plans to present the work of the Vestry to the parish at the Annual Parish meeting;
- learned from the Dean about the progress of the *Journey in Faith* class this year and the use of the *Journey in Faith* service card;
- received the report of the Finance Committee indicating that the Cathedral ended 2011with a favorable \$135,197 variance in budgeted income and a favorable \$74,652 variance in budgeted expenses.


Religious Questions in William Faulkner's The Sound and the Fury



From The Youth Pastor...

Almighty God, whose blessed Son was led by the Spirit to be tempted by Satan; Come quickly to help us who are assaulted by many temptations; and, as you know the weaknesses of each of us, let each one find you mighty to save; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

Whatever else Lent may be about, it must first of all be about Jesus. If we fast and pray and serve the poor, it is because Jesus fasted, prayed and served the poor. If we willingly enter into some form of suffering for forty days, it is because Jesus entered into suffering for forty days. Lent is ultimately not about giving up snacks for the sake of self-denial. It is about giving up self-centeredness for the sake of Jesus, and with him acknowledging that God alone is worthy of our worship.

In the Gospel for the First Sunday of Lent Jesus is led into the desert for forty days to be tempted and tested – tempted as Adam and Eve were, tested as Israel was – to prove whether he would be the one human being to submit fully to the will of God, or whether he too would succumb to the universal human tendency to follow his own will. Would he be like the first Adam 'One does not live by bread alone, but by and turn away from God, or would he follow

his vocation to be the Second Adam, the firstborn of a family of sons and daughters who would turn back to God?

A lot is at stake in this desert.

And a lot is at stake when we find ourselves in the desert with Jesus during Lent, for the same question is posed to us: Will we turn away and follow Adam, or will we turn to God and follow Jesus?

In the early Church Lent was the time set aside for the preparation of new believers before they were baptized at the Great Vigil of Easter. Prayer, fasting, giving, studying the Scriptures and Creed, fighting the temptations of the devil – these were preparations for the day when they would stand before the whole church and promise to follow Jesus forever. And today, we take up these very same disciplines as we journey toward Confirmation.

For Jesus, too, this forty-day experience of fasting and prayer in the desert was a time of preparation – a time to be strengthened for the ministry that lay before him.

In the desert Jesus was tempted to turn stone into bread, to seek comfort rather than God's will. He rebuked the devil with words of Scripture: "It is written: every word that comes from the mouth of

God." He was tempted to seek safety rather than follow God's path to the cross. Again he responded with Scripture: "Do not put the Lord your God to the test." He was tempted to seize worldly power rather than laying down his own life, if only he would worship the devil. His response? Scripture again: "Worship the Lord your God and serve only Him."

Jesus' response in those forty days showed that he was ready to take up the cross, the instrument of salvation, and to give his life to offer us the free gift of life.

If our Lent is a participation in Jesus' forty days in the wilderness, what does that mean for us? Simply that Lent is a challenge to us to take up our cross, to do God's will rather than our own, to live by the bread of his words more than we live by food and drink. And this challenge of Lent is exactly the challenge of the Baptismal Covenant – the challenge that we claim for our own when we kneel before the Bishop at Confirmation. So this Lent, as we prepare for the Great Vigil, let us remember that nothing matters more than following the way of Jesus, because his way alone leads to the glory of the Resurrection.





General

Meetings

In order to honor the solemnity of Holy Week, the Dean has asked that all administrative meetings of the Cathedral be rescheduled for other times during the month of April. This announcement is inclusive of all staff, Vestry, Cluster, and committee meetings of the Cathedral.

Confession

Throughout Lent and Holy Week, priests of the Cathedral will be available by appointment (and on Thursdays in the Chapel from 11 a.m.-12 noon) for those seeking to make a Confession according to the form *Reconciliation of a Penitent* as listed on page 447 of the *Book of Common Prayer*, 1979. Also, during Holy Week, a priest will sit inside the altar rail in the Cathedral Chapel between 11 a.m. and 12 p.m., Monday through Wednesday, for those who wish to make unscheduled Holy Week confessions.

Palm Sunday

Palm Sunday Passion Walk Parishioners of all ages are invited to join in the Palm Sunday Passion Walk during the Sunday school hour. Each stop along the walk features a different Holy Week event.

Maundy Thursday

A Vigil with the Blessed Sacrament—an ancient tradition continues at Christ Church Cathedral. Good Friday is the one day in the Church Year when the Holy Eucharist is not celebrated, as the Church mourns the death of the Messiah. But so as not to be denied the benefits of his passion in the Sacrament, the tradition arose wherein the faithful kept vigil with the consecrated Bread and Wine from Maundy Thursday night until the time of its distribution on Good Friday (Mass of the Pre-Sanctified, see the *Book of Common Prayer*, 1979, p. 282).

In order to facilitate this Vigil, the Cathedral Chapel will be prepared with an Altar of Repose (for the Reserved Sacrament) following the Stripping of the Altar on Maundy Thursday.

In mid March, a sign-up list will be posted in the Parish Hall asking parishioners to sign up for a one-hour vigil sometime during the night. Three people will be asked to keep vigil at each hour. Volunteers at the Receptionist's desk will let those in who come during the night for prayer. Silence is kept throughout the vigil. Candles may be lit at the close of one's time of prayer. Devotional resources for the hour will be made available in the Chapel, though the classical practices of Centering and Contemplative prayer are frequently employed by those keeping vigil.

Good Friday

The Good Liturgy

This year's Good Friday Liturgy will be offered at 12 noon only, so as to have the Cathedral's gathering conform more closely to the historical hour of the crucifixion. The liturgy will include the Liturgy of the Word, Sermon, the Solemn Collects, the Veneration of the Cross, the Reproaches, and Communion from the Reserved Sacrament.

Holy Saturday

The Great Vigil of Easter

Note: This year's Easter Vigil begins at 7 p. m. Bishop Bauerschmidt will celebrate and preach.

Easter Day

Flowering of the Cross—On Easter morning a large wooden cross suitable for "flowering" will be placed at the top of the stairs by the handicapped access ramp exit to the side parking lot door. Bring flowers with you when you come to worship on Easter Day—something local, something from your garden—and place them in the cross. Whether before you worship or after (7 a.m., 8:30 a.m., or 11a.m.) stop by and watch the cross grow flush with the colors of Christ's Resurrection!


