HOSPITAL ADMISSIONS

Unless otherwise indicated, we will pray for each person three consecutive weeks. The person placing the name on the list must contact the church office 615.255.7729, if the name should remain on the list for an additional three weeks.

Eucharistic Visitor Ministry

Bible Challenge Readings for October

We are ready to begin! As we undertake this transforming discipline of reading the Word of God over the next year, there are a few things to consider.

- You are encouraged to read a portion of the Bible each day.
- We begin reading on October 1, but know that if you are unable to start that day you can jump in when you are ready.
- The readings for the month of October are listed below and can also be found on our website.
- Give yourself a full year to read the entire Bible. The Bible has a profound message, and you need to give yourself ample time to allow God's Word to penetrate your heart, mind and soul deeply.
- The following translations are suggested: The New Oxford Annotated Version, The New International Version, and the Common English Version. But there are many other fine translations you may wish to use.
- Many may want to read their Bible using their iPad, iPhone, Kindle or Nook or listen to the Bible on CD's.
- Beginning on Sunday October 7, and Wednesday October 10, we will have weekly gatherings to give us opportunity to reflect and discuss the readings. These gatherings are not required but are offered simply to enhance and support our experience together.

Marcus Hummon, has been called Nashville's Renaissance Man. He has enjoyed a successful career as a songwriter, recording artist, producer and studio musician, playwright and auther. His songs have been recorded in Pop, R&B, gospel. and most notably in country music. Feed is a cradle Episcopalian who migrated from western Michigan to Nashville forty years ago. Known professionally as Too Slim, he's a founding member of the Grammy-witning western quartet Riders In The Sky, with which he has bourd and recorded for 35 years. His songin have been recorded by Riders as well as the Mythical Trifecta-Tammy Wyneme, William Shatner, and Don Rickles. He's written and collaborated on hundreds of radio, stage and TV shows, and is well known in small circles for his put-ons, japes, and zany antics, as well as poetry. He is a member of the Christ Church Cathedral community of faith.

October 17-Craig Wiseman

Cruig is one of today's most celebrated songwriters and has played a significant role in shaping Country music. Craig has been named ASCAP's Songwriter of the Year in 2003, 2005 and 2007. In 2005, be won a Grammy for Best Country Song for Tim McGiraw's 10 week #1, "Live Like You Were Dying." He also took home the CMA & ACM Song Of The Year awards for "Live Like You Were Dying" and in the following year for Brooks & Dunn's "Believe." The Role of the Laity: From New Testament Times to the Episcopal Church Today Featuring

The Reverend Dr. Benjamin J. King

What is the role of the laity in our churches? In the Catholic Church of the Victorian era, one English Monsignor notoriously answered: "To hunt, to shoot, to entertain. These matters they understand, but to meddle with ecclesiastical matters they have no right at all." In a study prepared for the recent General Convention, a different answer was given: "The Episcopal Church has historically embraced and legitimized laity, bishops and clergy equally to take their place in the governance of the church." Dr. Benjamin J. King's lectures will examine the various roles of the laity since New Testament times so that we might better understand what the role of the laity could be today.



Dr. King is Assistant Professor of Church History and Director of the Advanced Degrees Program at The University of the South School of Theology. He studied History and Theology at Cambridge University, received a Masters in Theology from Harvard Divinity School and a Ph.D. in Theology from Durham University in the United Kingdom. A winner of the 2011 John Templeton Award for Theological Promise,

Dr. King's highly acclaimed book, *Newman and the Alexandrian Fathers*, examines the influence of the earliest Christian theologians on the most prominent 19th century Christian theologians.



In youth ministry this is especially important; whether it's a mom or dad driving a minivan filled with eighth-graders, a Confirmation sponsor sharing wisdom with a younger person, or a high-school senior preaching in the Assembly, we all have a part to play in this mission of nurturing young disciples.

This month we begin a series of reflections from various members of the congregation who share their experiences of youth ministry at the Cathedral, with the hope that these stories will draw attention to the way each of us can build up the body of Christ. Our first reflection comes from Trone and Catherine Sawyer, who serve as Sunday school teachers, youth basketball coaches and Bible study leaders (and are

soon to be new parents!) This month Catherine reflects on their experiences with informal small group ministry.

We began attending Christ Church about five years ago. Trone immediately became quite involved with the youth group. After changes to Wednesday night programming, some kids still wanted to get together. Trone began to go to dinner weekly with three sophomore boys. They would meet at a local restaurant and chat for an hour. Topics ranged from politics to theology to asking a girl on a date. Three years later, the boys were seniors and the weekly dinners were still going strong. At that point, I had also became involved in the youth group, teaching Sunday School and helping coach the Lampshadez (girls' basketball powerhouse team). At the beginning of the spring semester, I made an announcement in Sunday School that I would like to start a girls' Bible study. Four girls

took the bait, and we have been meeting weekly ever since. To date, we have read through two books of the Bible and are beginning Paul's letters this fall.


This casual ministry has been a tremendous blessing to both of us. An added bonus has been that we have not only gotten to know these young people but have also gotten to know their wonderful parents. It has been a very easy way to be involved and has reaped many benefits. Getting involved with youth ministry can mean knowing the names of every young person who walks through the doors, but it can also mean really getting to know just a few. We are thankful for the relationships we have formed in this casual, small-group format.

The 2012-2013 Sacred Space for the City Arts Series kicks off this month with a three-night run of Stand, a play by Nashville playwright and Music Row audio producer Jim Reyland. The performances will take place October 18-20 at 7:30 p.m. in Cheek Hall.

Based on the true story of the friendship that developed between Reyland and J.J. Reyland has been a volunteer for Room Ellis, a homeless man with a history of addiction and mental illness, Stand has only two characters, Johnny and Mark, played by veteran actors Barry Scott and which is scheduled for 36 performances Chip Arnold. As Arnold said in an interview with the Nashville Scene,

"This is a combination of art and real life, in the sense that you are exposing a problem that's very real and chronic all across the country. But mainly this is a buddy story about two people who come from different places of brokenness and learn to love and respect and care for each other."

In The Inn and the Campus for Human Development for more than 25 years. A portion of the proceeds from Stand, in 14 venues across Middle Tennessee, will go to Room In The Inn to help

Nashville's homeless population. Reyland hopes his play will not only move audiences but also put a face on homelessness. As he told the Scene, "I've been asked why I spend time with people who are at the end of their lives instead of with people who are at the beginning of their lives...I just felt that these were the folks at the very bottom of the rung, and it seemed like they needed the most help...It's a very powerful thing that happens emotionally, with the possibility that you can make a difference."
