Christ Church--- Faster 1944

Dear Friends of Christ Church:

In the year 1889 Robert Browning, the British poet, died. An impressive funeral service was held in Westminster Abbey on the last day of that year; but Sir Edward Burne-Jones, who was present on that occasion, declares that it was all too somber. The note of grief and regret was dominant. "I would have given something for a banner or two," says Burne-Jones, "and much more would I have given if a chorister had come out on the triforium and rent the air with a trumpet." Who of us, remembering the unconquerable optimism of Browning, would disagree with the artist? It was the note of a trumpet, challenging, defiant, triumphant, that Burne-Jones wanted to hear that day.

That is exactly the note of the Easter Festival, for we are now celebrating a victory. Easter is not a day of a wistful hope; it is rather the feast of a blazing and glorious fact. The flowers of Easter are not the fragile symbols of a lovely sentiment; they are the triumphant banners of an actual event. The message of Easter is not an argument for the immortality of the soul; it is an announcement, "Christ is Risen!" The Lord is risen from the dead. The third day He rose! We saw Him dead and buried. And we saw Him, talked with Him, after He was risen from the dead, and behold. He is alive forevermore!

The Resurrection of Christ was not a mere survival of death; it was a definite triumph over it. He rose the complete Conqueror of death. And once we have entered into the experience of this Easter Gospel, we shall have no fear of death—for ourselves or for those we love. One does not ordinarily turn to the movies for illustrations of eternal life, but you will remember a film called "The Iron Mask" that had a great moment in it. D'Artagnan, having carried his arduous task to a triumphant conclusion only to be dealt a foul and fatal blow, staggers out to die alone. Then the clouds part and one sees his three dauntless comrades smiling down at him, and reaching down to welcome him to the new life. Then there flashes on the screen, not the conventional word "End," but the startling word "Beginning."

This is the word of Easter—Beginning. Have no fear. We shall see our friends again, in a country prepared, in a place called home, where we shall know as we are known, seeing no longer through a glass darkly, but face to face; where we shall never grow old; where we shall never grow weary; where the boatman with the silver oars leads us across the river that has no bridge; where "O sweet and blessed country" is no longer a hymn of hope, but an everlasting experience; where it is not taps but reveille! May God give us this blessed and joyous Easter Faith!
