COLLECT OF THE DAY

O God, whose blessed Son was manifested that he might destroy the works of the devil and make us the children of God and heirs of eternal life: Grant us, we beseech thee, that having this hope, we may purify ourselves even as he is pure; that, when he shall appear again with power and great glory, we may be made like unto him in his eternal and glorious kingdom; where with thee, O Father, and thee, O Holy Ghost, he liveth and reigneth ever, one God, world without end. *Amen.*

OLD TESTAMENT READING – 1 Kings 17:8-16

Then the word of the LORD came to him, saying, ‘Go now to Zarephath, which belongs to Sidon, and live there; for I have commanded a widow there to feed you.’ So he set out and went to Zarephath. When he came to the gate of the town, a widow was there gathering sticks; he called to her and said, ‘Bring me a little water in a vessel, so that I may drink.’ As she was going to bring it, he called to her and said, ‘Bring me a morsel of bread in your hand.’ But she said, ‘As the LORD your God lives, I have nothing baked, only a handful of meal in a jar, and a little oil in a jug; I am now gathering a couple of sticks, so that I may go home and prepare it for myself and my son, that we may eat it, and die.’ Elijah said to her, ‘Do not be afraid; go and do as you have said; but first make me a little cake of it and bring it to me, and afterwards make something for yourself and your son. For thus says the LORD the God of Israel: The jar of meal will not be emptied and the jug of oil will not fail until the day that the LORD sends rain on the earth.’ She went and did as Elijah said, so that she as well as he and her household ate for many days. The jar of meal was not emptied; neither did the jug of oil fail, according to the word of the LORD that he spoke by Elijah.

NEW TESTAMENT READING – Hebrews 9:24-28

For Christ did not enter a sanctuary made by human hands, a mere copy of the true one, but he entered into heaven itself, now to appear in the presence of God on our behalf. Nor was it to offer himself again and again, as the high priest enters the Holy Place year after year with blood that is not his own; for then he would have had to suffer again and again since the foundation of the world. But as it is, he has appeared once for all at the end of the age to remove sin by the sacrifice of himself. And just as it is appointed for mortals to die once, and after that the judgment, so Christ, having been offered once to bear the sins of many, will appear a second time, not to deal with sin, but to save those who are eagerly waiting for him.

THE GOSPEL LESSON – Mark 12:38-44

As he taught, he said, ‘Beware of the scribes, who like to walk around in long robes, and to be greeted with respect in the market-places, and to have the best seats in the synagogues and places of honor at banquets! They devour widows’ houses and for the sake of appearance say long prayers. They will receive the greater condemnation.’ He sat down opposite the treasury, and watched the crowd putting money into the treasury. Many rich people put in large sums. A poor widow came and put in two small copper coins, which are worth a penny. Then he called his disciples and said to them, ‘Truly I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all those who are contributing to the treasury. For all of them have contributed out of their abundance; but she out of her poverty has put in everything she had, all she had to live on.’

AID Relief for Victims of Hurricane Sandy

The pictures of devastation shown by the news media coming in from coastal New Jersey, New York City, and Connecticut are unthinkable, and yet Nashville knows precisely what is facing the communities hardest hit by the floods and winds of the recent hurricane. We also have two direct connections to ministries in the area: St. Simon's Episcopal Church, Mantoloking, New Jersey, where the Dean serves while on vacation during the summer, and Calvary Episcopal Church, Summit, New Jersey, where the Reverend Matthew Corkern is Rector. In Mantoloking, the church building of St. Simon's is still standing but with significant damage. TV stations are reporting that 20 homes have been washed out to sea. A similar number were moved off their foundations and into the bay. Numerous year-round residents have had no place to turn. For some it will be months, if not years, before they have a place to call home again. In Summit, power outages and flood waters have displaced numerous local residents. Last night Calvary Episcopal Church opened its doors and more than 150 people took shelter on the campus of this prominent parish in the Summit community. **Any aid relief you wish to direct to those affected by the hurricane in these communities may be sent to Christ Church Cathedral. Please make your check out to: Christ Church Cathedral, memo: NJ Hurricane Relief, Dean's Discretionary Fund (DDF).** Any checks received in the Cathedral office will be split 50/50 and sent directly to the Senior Wardens of St. Simon's, Mantoloking and Calvary Episcopal Church, Summit to aid in the hurricane relief needed in their respective communities.
