Prayers

Remember, O Lord, the peoples of the world divided into many nations and tongues. Deliver us from every evil that gets in the way of your saving purpose; and fulfill the promise of peace to your people on earth.

Kyrie

Deliver us from all oppression, conspiracy, and rebellion; from violence, battle, and murder; and from dying suddenly and unprepared.

Deliver us from all blindness of heart; from pride, vainglory, and hypocrisy; from envy, hatred, and malice; and from all want of charity.

Deliver us from all inordinate and sinful affections; and from all the deceits of the world, the flesh, and the devil.

Kyrie

Make wars to cease in all the world; give all nations unity, peace, and concord; and bestow freedom upon all peoples.

Rule the hearts of your servants, the President of the United States, and all others in authority, that they may do justice, and love mercy, and walk in the ways of truth.

Forgive our enemies, persecutors, and slanderers, and turn their hearts.

Kyrie

Show your pity upon all prisoners and captives, the homeless and the hungry, and all who are desolate and oppressed.

Support, help, and comfort all who are in danger, necessity, and tribulation.

Preserve, and provide for, all women in childbirth, young children and orphans, the widowed, and all whose homes are broken or torn by strife.

Kyrie

Give us true repentance; forgive us all our sins, negligences, and ignorances; and endue us with the grace of your Holy Spirit to amend our lives according to your holy Word.

Strengthen such as do stand; comfort and help the weak-hearted; raise up those who fall; and finally beat down Satan under our feet.

Have mercy upon all mankind.

Kyrie

Almighty God, kindle, we pray, in every heart the true love of peace, and guide with your wisdom those who take counsel for the nations of the earth; that in tranquility your dominion may increase, until the earth is filled with the knowledge of your love; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

The worship tradition represented in this evening service began in the 1940's in the ecumenical monastic community called Taizé in France. Brother Roger, who started the community, moved to France from Switzerland in 1940. When World War II began, he had the conviction that he should offer assistance to people in difficult circumstances. The small village of Taizé was close to the demarcation line that divided France in half and so was well situated to be a place of welcome for refugees fleeing the war.
