Since God's children share flesh and blood, Jesus himself likewise shared the same things, so that through death he might destroy the one who has the power of death, that is, the devil, and free those who all their lives were held in slavery by the fear of death. For it is clear that he did not come to help angels, but the descendants of Abraham. Therefore he had to become like his brothers and sisters in every respect, so that he might be a merciful and faithful high priest in the service of God, to make a sacrifice of atonement for the sins of the people. Because he himself was tested by what he suffered, he is able to help those who are being tested.

THE GOSPEL LESSON - Luke 2:22-40

When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, the parents of Jesus brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the law of the Lord, "Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord"), and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, "a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons."

Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying,

"Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace,
according to your word;
for my eyes have seen your salvation,
which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples,
a light for revelation to the Gentiles
and for glory to your people Israel."

And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, "This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed-- and a sword will pierce your own soul too."

There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband seven years after her marriage, then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshiped there with fasting and prayer night and day. At that moment she came, and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem.

When they had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favor of God was upon him.



THE REVEREND H. JACOBA HURST TO ASSIST CHRIST CHURCH CLERGY



Father Hurst will serve the Cathedral as Priest Associate, and assist the Dean and the Curate in matters of pastoral care while Canon Manning is away on sabbatical. He will also be responsible for the Tuesday and Wednesday 12:15 p.m. celebrations of the Holy Eucharist. Father Hurst is not new to our congregation; he has faithfully assisted the Cathedral this past year by celebrating the Friday 12:15 p.m. chapel liturgy and being present for various other liturgies.

The Reverend H. Jacoba Hurst, a native of Kentucky, was ordained priest in June 1972 at Christ Church Cathedral in Lexington, Kentucky. After ordination, he served as college chaplain and director of United Campus Ministries at Morehead State University, in Morehead, Kentucky, as well as vicar of the Episcopal Church on campus. After two years, he was called to be curate at the Cathedral in Lexington. Following his ministry at the Cathedral, Father Hurst worked as director of an ecumenical organization in Vancouver, British Columbia, focusing on inter-faith dialog. St. Anne's Church in Tifton, Georgia called him to be rector in 1982 and his ministry at St. Anne's lasted twenty five years. During his tenure as rector, Father Hurst initiated the Stephen Ministry program, the first in the diocese, and developed an extensive pastoral outreach ministry using trained laypersons. He also served as the rural dean of southwest Georgia and the ecumenical officer of the diocese. He offered his gifts to the diocese in many capacities: president of the Standing Committee, member of Diocesan Council, Nominating Committee for the Episcopate, Liturgical Commission, Committee for Re-Structuring the Diocese, Pastoral Advisory Committee to the Bishop, Deputy to General Convention, as well as others.

He is a chaplain of the International Order of St. Luke the Physician, and founded the first chapter of the Order in the Diocese of Georgia, in addition to serving as chaplain for the state of Georgia. For three years, Father Hurst served as president of the Georgia State Council of Churches.

Following his retirement from St. Anne's parish several years ago, Father Hurst traveled extensively and lived in Colorado before moving to Nashville in 2011. In July of 2012, Bishop Bauerschmidt asked Father Hurst to serve as vicar of St. Luke's in Springfield on a part-time basis, where he continues to serve.
