THE OLD TESTAMENT LESSON - Job 38:1-11

Then the LORD answered Job out of the whirlwind:

"Who is this that darkens counsel by words without knowledge? Gird up your loins like a man,

I will question you, and you shall declare to me.
"Where were you when I laid the foundation of the earth?

Tell me, if you have understanding.

Who determined its measurements—surely you know!

Or who stretched the line upon it?

On what were its bases sunk,

or who laid its cornerstone
when the morning stars sang together
and all the heavenly beings shouted for joy?

THE NEW TESTAMENT LESSON - 2 Corinthians 6:1-13

As we work together with Christ, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain. For he says,

"At an acceptable time I have listened to you, and on a day of salvation I have helped you."

See, now is the acceptable time; see, now is the day of salvation! We are putting no obstacle in anyone's way, so that no fault may be found with our ministry, but as servants of God we have commended ourselves in every way: through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, beatings, imprisonments, riots, labors, sleepless nights, hunger; by purity, knowledge, patience, kindness, holiness of spirit, genuine love, truthful speech, and the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; in honor and dishonor, in ill repute and good repute. We are treated as impostors, and yet are true; as unknown, and yet are well known; as dying, and see—we are alive; as punished, and yet not killed; as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything.

We have spoken frankly to you Corinthians; our heart is wide open to you. There is no restriction in our affections, but only in yours. In return-I speak as to children-open wide your hearts also.

THE GOSPEL LESSON - Mark 4:35-41

When evening had come, Jesus said to his disciples, "Let us go across to the other side." And leaving the crowd behind, they took him with them in the boat, just as he was. Other boats were with him. A great windstorm arose, and the waves beat into the boat, so that the boat was already being swamped. But he was in the stern, asleep on the cushion; and they woke him up and said to him, "Teacher, do you not care that we are perishing?" He woke up and rebuked the wind, and said to the sea, "Peace! Be still!" Then the wind ceased, and there was a dead calm. He said to them, "Why are you afraid? Have you still no faith?" And they were filled with great awe and said to one another, "Who then is this, that even the wind and the sea obey him?"



JUNE ECONOMIC JUSTICE CHALLENGE: REDUCE THE PACKAGING WE USE

Grant that we, remembering the account we must one day give, may be faithful stewards of your good gifts. (BCP, p. 259).



One way of being faithful stewards of the gifts of creation is not to use more than is necessary. This month, we challenge you to pay attention to how much packaging is in things you use and work to reduce your use of packaging. A few easy ways to start: Bring reusable bags whenever you shop

(keep some handy in your car or purse). When making purchasing choices, consider the amount and type of packaging, and give preference to items with less and/or recyclable packaging. Bring your own travel mug to the coffee shop and your own refillable water bottle to work. Let's work this month to follow the common "Reduce, reuse, recycle" mantra for good creation stewardship!

FIRST BEQUEST TO CHRIST CHURCH

Given to the Glory of God and to Christ Church. Mrs. Ann Minnick Kendrick left \$500.00 in her will to Christ Church.

In her Davidson County will, recorded August 18, 1876, Mrs. Kendrick directed that her Executor, "within the next five years, should pay the Vestry of Christ Church \$500.00, for the benefit of said church." She further directed that \$100.00, be paid Rose Brown "as a testimonial of appreciation of her faithful services" and also to pay to her husband James Kendrick "five dollars in gold coin to buy a ring to be worn in my memory."

The Cathedral Archives has assembled a detailed report of all Gifts, Memorials, and Bequests from 1831 through 2014. This material was produced through research of the Vestry Minutes, church bulletins, newsletters and the annual reports of Christ Church Cathedral, and Davidson County Will records. EfM is a Christian education and formation program developed by the School of Theology at Sewanee, which takes place at Episcopal churches across the country and online. EfM covers the basics of a theological education in the Old and New Testaments, church history, liturgy, and theology with emphasis on theological

reflection. Students enroll for one year at a time and complete the course in four years. More information is available on the EfM website, efm.sewanee.edu. The cost is \$350/year.
