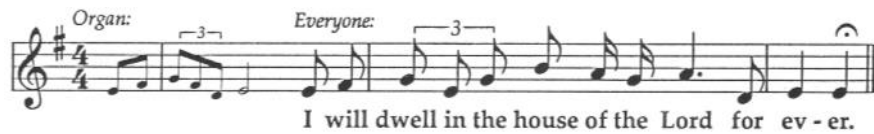
COLLECT OF THE DAY

Almighty God, the fountain of all wisdom, you know our necessities before we ask and our ignorance in asking: Have compassion on our weakness, and mercifully give us those things which for our unworthiness we dare not, and for our blindness we cannot ask; through the worthiness of your Son Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. *Amen.*

THE OLD TESTAMENT LESSON – Jeremiah 23:1-6

Woe to the shepherds who destroy and scatter the sheep of my pasture! says the LORD. Therefore thus says the LORD, the God of Israel, concerning the shepherds who shepherd my people: It is you who have scattered my flock, and have driven them away, and you have not attended to them. So I will attend to you for your evil doings, says the LORD. Then I myself will gather the remnant of my flock out of all the lands where I have driven them, and I will bring them back to their fold, and they shall be fruitful and multiply. I will raise up shepherds over them who will shepherd them, and they shall not fear any longer, or be dismayed, nor shall any be missing, says the LORD.

The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will raise up for David a righteous Branch, and he shall reign as king and deal wisely, and shall execute justice and righteousness in the land. In his days Judah will be saved and Israel will live in safety. And this is the name by which he will be called: "The LORD is our righteousness."

THE NEW TESTAMENT LESSON – Ephesians 2:11-22

Remember that at one time you Gentiles by birth, called “the uncircumcision” by those who are called “the circumcision” -- a physical circumcision made in the flesh by human hands-- remember that you were at that time without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth of Israel, and strangers to the covenants of promise, having no hope and without God in the world. But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ. For he is our peace; in his flesh he has made both groups into one and has broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us. He has abolished the law with its commandments and ordinances, that he might create in himself one new humanity in place of the two, thus making peace, and might reconcile both groups to God in one body through the cross, thus putting to death that hostility through it. So he came and proclaimed peace to you who were far off and peace to those who were near; for through him both of us have access in one Spirit to the Father. So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are citizens with the saints and also members of the household of God, built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the cornerstone. In him the whole structure is joined together and grows into a holy temple in the Lord; in whom you also are built together spiritually into a dwelling place for God.

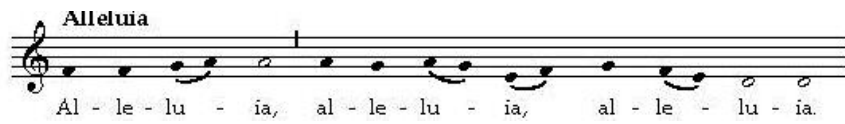

THE GOSPEL LESSON – Mark 6:30-34, 53-56

The apostles gathered around Jesus, and told him all that they had done and taught. He said to them, “Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while.” For many were coming and going, and they had no leisure even to eat. And they went away in the boat to a deserted place by themselves. Now many saw them going and recognized them, and they hurried there on foot from all the towns and arrived ahead of them. As he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things.

When they had crossed over, they came to land at Gennesaret and moored the boat. When they got out of the boat, people at once recognized him, and rushed about that whole region and began to bring the sick on mats to wherever they heard he was. And wherever he went, into villages or cities or farms, they laid the sick in the marketplaces, and begged him that they might touch even the fringe of his cloak; and all who touched it were healed.

HOME AT NAZARETH WINDOWS

Given to the Glory of God and in Memory of the Warner Children.

Mr. & Mrs. Leslie Warner's only children, Leslie Jr., John and Maria, died within fourteen months of each other between January 1886 and March 1887.

Mrs. Warner served as chairman of the Kensington Circle, the ladies' organization that purchased the pews for the new church in 1894. In the window, we see Jesus represented as the light of the world and the Lamb of God. Nearby are seen his mother Mary and Joseph.



The windows were designed, prior to 1909, by Louis C. Tiffany & Company, New York. The windows are located in the east clerestory (upper right side).

EDUCATION FOR MINISTRY (EfM)

EfM is a Christian education and formation program developed by the School of Theology at Sewanee, which takes place at Episcopal churches across the country and online. EfM covers the basics of a theological education in the Old and New Testaments, church history, liturgy, and theology with emphasis on theological reflection. Students enroll for one year at a time and complete the course in four years. More information is available on the EfM website, efm.sewanee.edu. The cost is \$350/year. Partial scholarships may be available. Christ Church groups meet on Tuesday evenings or Wednesday mornings during the academic year and each has room for a limited number of new students. CATHEDRAL'S HANDS OF MERCY EVENT NASHVILLE FOOD PROJECT

"Hands of Mercy" events are one-time opportunities for members of the Cathedral congregation to serve and benefit a worthy institution supported by the Cathedral. The next Hands of Mercy event will be August 22, 2015, at the Nashville Food Project, located on the campus of Woodmont Christian Church at 3605 Hillsboro Pike. Approximately 35 volunteers are needed to work in TNFP's garden and prepare food. Garden volunteers will work from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m., and food prep will take place from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m. The food prep team will prepare meals in the kitchen, using recovered, donated, and garden-grown food to cook healthy hot meals. There's a lot of creativity involved in planning meals based on what comes in from the food donation partners—and a lot of work for the volunteers who chop, slice, clean, assemble, blanch, compost, and cook. Children age 10 and up are welcome to participate, so this will be a wonderful opportunity for families to work together to help the vulnerable populations served by the Nashville Food Project.
