
THE GOSPEL LESSON - John 6:1-21

Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him, Jesus said to Philip, "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost." So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world."

When Jesus realized that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself.

When evening came, his disciples went down to the sea, got into a boat, and started across the sea to Capernaum. It was now dark, and Jesus had not yet come to them. The sea became rough because a strong wind was blowing. When they had rowed about three or four miles, they saw Jesus walking on the sea and coming near the boat, and they were terrified. But he said to them, "It is I; do not be afraid." Then they wanted to take him into the boat, and immediately the boat reached the land toward which they were going.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

ANGEL LECTERN

Given to the Glory of God and in memory of Sarah Nichol.

The bronze angel lectern was given by the Parish Aid Society in memory of Sarah Nichol who had served as treasurer of the Society from 1874 to 1894. St. Gabriel the Archangel is seen with his trumpet. On the base are these words of appreciation for Sarah: "She doth little kindnesses Which most leave undone or despise For naught that sets one's heart at ease and giveth happiness or peace is low esteemed in her eyes." The lectern was designed by C. J. Upjohn in 1894 and cast by A. T. Lorme of New York in 1895. The lecture was dedicated on Ascension Day, 1895.

Children age 10 and up are welcome to participate, so this will be a wonderful opportunity for families to work together to help the vulnerable populations served by the Nashville Food Project. UPCOMING CATECHESIS OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD TRAINING

Christ Church Cathedral will be offering a Catechesis of the Good Shepherd Level I training course for adults. Level I of the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd covers the presentations that are offered to 3-6 year olds. The course includes information on the characteristics of the 3-6 year old child and lessons that have been used over the past 50 years to encourage the faith life of young children through prayer, liturgy and the Bible. A typical training lasts for 90 hours and Christ Church will offer a new format for this class. The course will meet as follows:

Saturday, September 12, 9 a.m.–2 p.m.; Saturday, January 30, 9 a.m.–2 p.m.; and Wednesdays, dinner at 5:30 p.m. followed by class from 6 to 8 p.m. These classes will be held beginning September 16 and continue to November 11; they will break until January 13 and continue to April 13 (with breaks for Ash Wednesday and Holy Week).

Childcare and meals will be provided for all classes. There is a nominal charge for the meal and a \$35 registration fee for Christ Church Cathedral parishioners. Completion of this course will prepare you to lead a Level I class for children or you may want to take this class for your own spiritual growth. Adult participants of all ages are welcome.
