THE NEW TESTAMENT LESSON – Ephesians 4:25 - 5:2

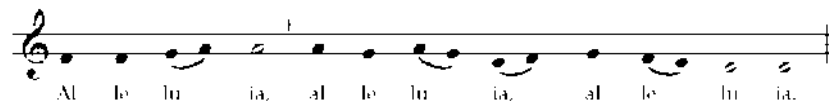

THE GREAT WHEEL WINDOW GIVEN TO THE GLORY OF GOD AND IN MEMORY OF JANE SMITH WASHINGTON

Mrs. Washington's husband, George Augustine Washington, had died in 1892 and the widow had asked to donate the central window over the altar in his memory. Quite unexpectedly, Mrs. Washington died, at 63, on February 11, 1894. In her memory, her children gave the Great Wheel Window, which was dedicated on All Saints Day 1894.



The Washington family lived at "Wessyngton" in Robertson County.

A plaque in recognition of the Great Wheel Window is located on the wall near the Baptistry. The Great Wheel Window, with angels playing early musical instruments in praise of God, is best viewed from the Chancel.

"Hands of Mercy" events are one-time opportunities for members of the Cathedral congregation to serve and benefit a worthy institution supported by the Cathedral. The next Hands of Mercy event will be August 22 at the Nashville Food Project, located on the campus of Woodmont Christian Church at 3605 Hillsboro Pike. Approximately 35 volunteers are needed to work in TNFP's garden and prepare food. Garden volunteers will work from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m., and food prep will take place from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m. The food prep team will prepare meals in the kitchen, using recovered, donated, and garden-grown food to cook healthy hot meals. There's a lot of creativity involved in planning meals based on what comes in from the food donation partners—and a lot of work for the volunteers who chop, slice, clean, assemble, blanch, compost, and cook. Children age 10 and up are welcome to participate, so this will be a wonderful opportunity for families to work together to help the vulnerable populations served by the Nashville Food Project. UPCOMING CATECHESIS OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD TRAINING

Christ Church Cathedral will be offering a Catechesis of the Good Shepherd Level I training course for adults. Level I of the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd covers the presentations that are offered to 3-6 year-olds. The course includes information on the characteristics of the 3-6 year-old child and lessons that have been used over the past 50 years to encourage the faith life of young children through prayer, liturgy, and the Bible. A typical training lasts for 90 hours and Christ Church will offer a new format for this class. The course will meet as follows:

Saturday, September 12, 9 a.m.–2 p.m.;
Saturday, January 30, 9 a.m.–2 p.m.; and
Wednesdays, dinner at 5:30 p.m. followed by class
from 6 to 8 p.m. These classes will be held beginning
September 16 and continue to November 11; they
will break until January 13 and continue to April 13
(with breaks for Ash Wednesday and Holy Week).

Childcare and meals will be provided for all classes. There is a nominal charge for the meal and a \$35 registration fee for Christ Church Cathedral parishioners. Completion of this course will prepare you to lead a Level I class for children or you may want to take this class for your own spiritual growth. Adult participants of all ages are welcome.
