THE OLD TESTAMENT LESSON - Joshua 24:1-2a, 14-18

Joshua gathered all the tribes of Israel to Shechem, and summoned the elders, the heads, the judges, and the officers of Israel; and they presented themselves before God. And Joshua said to all the people, "Thus says the LORD, the God of Israel:

"Now therefore revere the LORD, and serve him in sincerity and in faithfulness; put away the gods that your ancestors served beyond the River, and in Egypt, and serve the LORD. Now if you are unwilling to serve the LORD, choose this day whom you will serve, whether the gods your ancestors served in the region beyond the River, or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are living; but as for me and my household, we will serve the LORD."

Then the people answered, "Far be it from us that we should forsake the LORD to serve other gods; for it is the LORD our God who brought us and our ancestors up from the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery, and who did those great signs in our sight. He protected us along all the way that we went, and among all the peoples through whom we passed; and the LORD drove out before us all the peoples, the Amorites who lived in the land. Therefore we also will serve the LORD, for he is our God."

THE NEW TESTAMENT LESSON - Ephesians 6:10-20

Be strong in the Lord and in the strength of his power. Put on the whole armor of God, so that you may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil. For our struggle is not against enemies of blood and flesh, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers of this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places. Therefore take up the whole armor of God, so that you may be able to withstand on that evil day, and having done everything, to stand firm. Stand therefore, and fasten the belt of truth around your waist, and put on the breastplate of righteousness. As shoes for your feet put on whatever will make you ready to proclaim the gospel of peace. With all of these, take the shield of faith, with which you will be able to quench all the flaming arrows of the evil one. Take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God.

Pray in the Spirit at all times in every prayer and supplication. To that end keep alert and always persevere in supplication for all the saints. Pray also for me, so that when I speak, a message may be given to me to make known with boldness the mystery of the gospel, for which I am an ambassador in chains. Pray that I may declare it boldly, as I must speak.

THE GOSPEL LESSON - John 6:56-69

Jesus said, "Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me, and I in them. Just as the living Father sent me, and I live because of the Father, so whoever eats me will live because of me. This is the bread that came down from heaven, not like that which your ancestors ate, and they died. But the one who eats this bread will live forever." He said these things while he was teaching in the synagogue at Capernaum.

When many of his disciples heard it, they said, "This teaching is difficult; who can accept it?" But Jesus, being aware that his disciples were complaining about it, said to them, "Does this offend you? Then what if you were to see the Son of Man ascending to where he was before? It is the spirit that gives life; the flesh is useless. The words that I have spoken to you are spirit and life. But among you there are some who do not believe." For Jesus knew from the first who were the ones that did not believe, and who was the one that would betray him. And he said, "For this reason I have told you that no one can come to me unless it is granted by the Father."

Because of this many of his disciples turned back and no longer went about with him. So Jesus asked the twelve, "Do you also wish to go away?" Simon Peter answered him, "Lord, to whom can we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and know that you are the Holy One of God."

women at the tomb with these words: "He is risen; he is not here." (Mark 16:6)

The windows were designed by Booth & Hogeman of New York and were in place when the church opened on December 16, 1894. The windows are located above the reredos and the old altar in the Chancel.

UPDATE ON LANDSCAPING FROM THE PROPERTY COMMITTEE:

The committee recommended that the vines on the southeast side of the building be trimmed away from the stained glass windows and this work was completed. The committee and Ben Page also recommended the removal of the gingko tree located in the A parking lot, next to the stairs leading to the door into the reception area of the church. For some time, the fruit produced by the tree has fallen on and around the stairs, and people walking up the stairs have been unable to avoid stepping on the fruit. This has caused numerous cleaning and maintenance issues outside and inside the reception area. The decaying fruit has a very unpleasant odor and, when tracked in, has stained the carpeting in the reception hallway. The Vestry approved the request to remove the tree and it was removed on August 20. The committee is in the early stages of looking at ways to improve the reception entryway. CATECHESIS OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD TRAINING

Christ Church Cathedral will be offering a Catechesis of the Good Shepherd Level I training course for adults. Level I of the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd covers the presentations that are offered to 3–6 year olds. The course includes information on the characteristics of the 3-6 year old child and lessons that have been used over the past 50 years to encourage the faith life of young children through prayer, liturgy and the Bible. A typical training lasts for 90 hours and Christ Church will offer a new format for this class. The course will meet as follows:

> Saturday, September 26, 9 a.m.-2 p.m.; Saturday, January 30, 9 a.m.-2:00 p.m.; and Wednesdays, dinner at 5:30 p.m. followed by class from 6 to 8 p.m. These classes will be held beginning September 23 and continue to November 11; they will break until January 13 and continue to April 13 (with breaks for Ash Wednesday and Holy Week).

Childcare and meals will be provided for all classes. There is a nominal charge for the meal and a \$35 registration fee for Christ Church parishioners. Completion of this course will prepare you to lead a Level I class for children or you may want to take this class for your own spiritual growth. Adult participants of all ages are welcome.
