THE NEW TESTAMENT LESSON - James 2:1-17

My brothers and sisters, do you with your acts of favoritism really believe in our glorious Lord Jesus Christ? For if a person with gold rings and in fine clothes comes into your assembly, and if a poor person in dirty clothes also comes in, and if you take notice of the one wearing the fine clothes and say, "Have a seat here, please," while to the one who is poor you say, "Stand there," or, "Sit at my feet," have you not made distinctions among yourselves, and become judges with evil thoughts? Listen, my beloved brothers and sisters. Has not God chosen the poor in the world to be rich in faith and to be heirs of the kingdom that he has promised to those who love him? But you have dishonored the poor. Is it not the rich who oppress you? Is it not they who drag you into court? Is it not they who blaspheme the excellent name that was invoked over you?

You do well if you really fulfill the royal law according to the scripture, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." But if you show partiality, you commit sin and are convicted by the law as transgressors. For whoever keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become accountable for all of it. For the one who said, "You shall not commit adultery," also said, "You shall not murder." Now if you do not commit adultery but if you murder, you have become a transgressor of the law. So speak and so act as those who are to be judged by the law of liberty. For judgment will be without mercy to anyone who has shown no mercy; mercy triumphs over judgment.


What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works? Can faith save you? If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, and one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill," and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead.

THE GOSPEL LESSON - Mark 7:24-37

Jesus set out and went away to the region of Tyre. He entered a house and did not want anyone to know he was there. Yet he could not escape notice, but a woman whose little daughter had an unclean spirit immediately heard about him, and she came and bowed down at his feet. Now the woman was a Gentile, of Syrophoenician origin. She begged him to cast the demon out of her daughter. He said to her, "Let the children be fed first, for it is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." But she answered him, "Sir, even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs." Then he said to her, "For saying that, you may go-the demon has left your daughter." So she went home, found the child lying on the bed, and the demon gone.

Then he returned from the region of Tyre, and went by way of Sidon towards the Sea of Galilee, in the region of the Decapolis. They brought to him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they begged him to lay his hand on him. He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, and put his fingers into his ears, and he spat and touched his tongue. Then looking up to heaven, he sighed and said to him, "Ephphatha," that is, "Be opened." And immediately his ears were opened, his tongue was released, and he spoke plainly. Then Jesus ordered them to tell no one; but the more he ordered them, the more zealously they proclaimed it. They were astounded beyond measure, saying, "He has done everything well; he even makes the deaf to hear and the mute to speak."

THE CATHEDRAL SAYS FAREWELL TO SCOTT SMITH



Scott Smith will become Head Sacristan at Trinity Wall Street in New York effective Tuesday, September 8, 2015. He has served since 2005 as volunteer sacristan and verger at Christ Church Cathedral. These roles can trace their history to the early days of the Christian Church. The sacristan today is similar to a stage manager who helps ensure that the liturgy unfolds in an orderly and beautiful manner. The

verger, wearing a black robe and carrying a virge, escorts processions and people on special occasions like Holy Baptisms and Solemn Holy Eucharists. The Episcopal Church has thousands of volunteer sacristans and vergers across the country. Some parishes have staff members who lead these activities, including National Cathedral in Washington, Grace Cathedral in San Francisco, and Trinity Wall Street, among others. Scott will be responsible for managing the sacristy and the staff sacristans as well as organizing and supporting the many volunteer vergers and liturgical servers at Trinity. He says his number one job, however, will be to welcome everyone who visits the church every day. He hopes that many Christ Church Cathedral parishioners will visit often! BEQUEST BY W. DUDLEY GALE. PORTRAIT OF BISHOP LEONIDAS POLK GIVEN TO THE GLORY OF GOD AND TO CHRIST CHURCH.

By his will, in 1963, W. Dudley Gale left his entire estate, valued at \$104,500.00, to Christ Church. The estate included his property and house furnishings, including a silver punch bowl, candelabra, and a portrait of Leonidas Polk, bishop of Louisiana. The portrait of Bishop Polk, by Cornelius Hankins, belonged to the bishop's daughter Katherine Polk Gale, who was the



grandmother of W. Dudley Gale. Bishop Polk's portrait is located in the Parish Hall. The portrait was conserved, with a gift, in 2007, from Jane and Richard Treadway at Cumberland Art Conservation, Nashville.
