COLLECT OF THE DAY

O God, you declare your almighty power chiefly in showing mercy and pity: Grant us the fullness of your grace, that we, running to obtain your promises, may become partakers of your heavenly treasure; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen.*

THE OLD TESTAMENT LESSON – Numbers 11:4-6, 10-16, 24-29

The rabble among them had a strong craving; and the Israelites also wept again, and said, "If only we had meat to eat! We remember the fish we used to eat in Egypt for nothing, the cucumbers, the melons, the leeks, the onions, and the garlic; but now our strength is dried up, and there is nothing at all but this manna to look at."

Moses heard the people weeping throughout their families, all at the entrances of their tents. Then the LORD became very angry, and Moses was displeased. So Moses said to the LORD, "Why have you treated your servant so badly? Why have I not found favor in your sight, that you lay the burden of all this people on me? Did I conceive all this people? Did I give birth to them, that you should say to me, 'Carry them in your bosom, as a nurse carries a sucking child,' to the land that you promised on oath to their ancestors? Where am I to get meat to give to all this people? For they come weeping to me and say, 'Give us meat to eat!' I am not able to carry all this people alone, for they are too heavy for me. If this is the way you are going to treat me, put me to death at once—if I have found favor in your sight—and do not let me see my misery."

So the LORD said to Moses, "Gather for me seventy of the elders of Israel, whom you know to be the elders of the people and officers over them; bring them to the tent of meeting, and have them take their place there with you."

So Moses went out and told the people the words of the LORD; and he gathered seventy elders of the people, and placed them all around the tent. Then the LORD came down in the cloud and spoke to him, and took some of the spirit that was on him and put it on the seventy elders; and when the spirit rested upon them, they prophesied. But they did not do so again.

Two men remained in the camp, one named Eldad, and the other named Medad, and the spirit rested on them; they were among those registered, but they had not gone out to the tent, and so they prophesied in the camp. And a young man ran and told Moses, "Eldad and Medad are prophesying in the camp." And Joshua son of Nun, the assistant of Moses, one of his chosen men, said, "My lord Moses, stop them!" But Moses said to him, "Are you jealous for my sake? Would that all the LORD's people were prophets, and that the LORD would put his spirit on them!"

THE NEW TESTAMENT LESSON – James 5:13-20

Are any among you suffering? They should pray. Are any cheerful? They should sing songs of praise. Are any among you sick? They should call for the elders of the church and have them pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord. The prayer of faith will save the sick, and the Lord will raise them up; and anyone who has committed sins will be forgiven. Therefore confess your sins to one another, and pray for one another, so that you may be healed. The prayer of the righteous is powerful and effective. Elijah was a human being like us, and he prayed fervently that it might not rain, and for three years and six months it did not rain on the earth. Then he prayed again, and the heaven gave rain and the earth yielded its harvest.

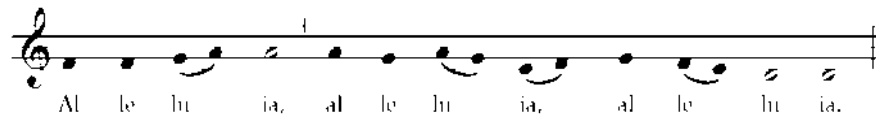

CHAPEL ALTAR

GIVEN TO THE GLORY OF GOD AND IN MEMORY OF
MEDORA CHEATHAM THAYER

The original 1888 chapel, designed by Francis Hatch Kimball, faced 9 Avenue North. The chapel altar, a memorial to Medora Cheatham Thayer, who died on February 3, 1880, was given by her sister Ada Cheatham. By 1913, the Vestry recognized a need for more office and classroom space. Russell Hart, Nashville architect, presented plans for a Parish House to replace the original chapel and to create a “new” chapel adjacent to the chancel. The altar was moved to the new chapel. During 1971, the altar was placed on loan to the Orthodox Church of the Redeemer. In 2010, Wayne Boyle-Parsley, Bishop-Rector of St. Basil’s Church, acquired the altar which he then gave back to the Cathedral. The altar was re-dedicated by Bishop John Bauerschmidt on December 16, 2010.

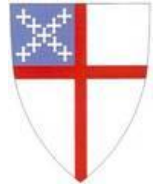

During the month of November, the Cathedral will offer a three-week introduction to a year-long program focusing on antiracism. The series will continue in January with a book study of *Between the World and Me* by Ta-Nehisi Coates and with the formation of small discussion groups. The program is designed to encourage us to explore ways of combatting racism not only in ourselves, but also in our church, our community, and in the world. We will analyze dynamics of power and oppression so that we can engage in the visioning of an alternative reality for the church and society.

LIVING INTO GOD'S DREAM FOR CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL

A Five-Year Review

The Cathedral community now stands at an important crossroads. We have renewed our mission statement ("Proclaim, Seek, Serve"). We have reorganized our committee and commission structure, accordingly poised to proclaim, seek, serve. We have observed and named the need to reach out to everyone in Davidson County and beyond, especially to the many new residents of Nashville within walking distance of the Cathedral. We are in the process of renewing the Cathedral website, social media ministries, and our parish database/financial record software. We have named the Cathedral's Endowment as a mission partner in this work, committing 65% of the annual distribution from the endowment (by 2022) to the work of supporting the General Fund and the remaining 35% of the annual distribution to new initiatives approved by the Vestry responsive to our changing environment for ministry. The Annual "Tithe of Time" is encouraging a stronger and greater embrace of the Cathedral's servant ministry. Our Every Member Canvass continues to encourage households to devote a larger portion of their charitable giving to the work and ministry of the Cathedral.

The Objective

The Vestry and clergy of the Cathedral are eager for everyone to become involved in parish life beyond attendance on Sunday mornings. We want to be a congregation that is responsive to the changing environment for ministry in Nashville. We want to be a congregation known for its forward-looking and gospel-centered posture.

A Visioning Process for All

To this end, we believe we are ready to set some 5- and 10-year goals for ministry at 9th and Broad. These goals should be few, concrete, and accompanied by program, staffing, membership, budget, and campus development/renewal implications. This fall the clergy and Vestry have organized dreaming/visioning sessions for the whole congregation and we hope that each of you will take time to become involved in at least one of the sessions. Please review the dates, times, and ministry designations below.

Your Vestry and Cathedral commissions have already begun to engage the central questions around the process of setting these ministry goals. Scott Viebranz has been engaged to serve as the facilitator of this process for the congregation. The completion of these dreaming sessions would yield a preliminary report at the 2016 Annual Meeting of the Cathedral congregation and set the tone for ministry focus discussions at the 2016 Vestry Retreat.
