A NEW LITURGICAL YEAR IS APPROACHING

We are slowly approaching the end of the year, as the Feast of Christ the King approaches. This is not the year in our academic calendar, our financial calendar, or even the one in the kitchen with the details of our busy lives. We are approaching the end of the church year. The ebb and flow of feasts and fasts are possibly the primary calendar events we should be paying attention to as we engage in this life of ours. In the Level I atria, the children are celebrating the gifts they have been given as they learn to set up a prayer table, a place where they can thank God for the gifts they have received. At home do you have a place set apart to pray, to say thank you or please, to stop and listen to Jesus? A simple prayer card or a candle can set this space apart. In Level II, the liturgical calendar is a visual tool and those children may be better able to tell you how close we are to Advent, the fast before the feast of Christmas. November is the month when we begin by remembering all of the saints, and we close it with Christ the King. All of the saints, including us, are people who answered the call they were hearing from God. We respond to the gifts that the Holy Spirit gives us in our everyday lives. These basic tools of prayer and place are tools/knowledge that help build faith and make it possible for the older children to spread their world view. The Level III child is looking around seeing family and church community and expanding out into the world, asking what is my place? What is my part? As adults, what tools do you need to hone along with the children, what practices do you want to incorporate into your daily calendar? Here is a spiritual challenge: Can you make the liturgical year your primary calendar? It will give you a new spiritual rest.

ADVENT BLUE DURING THE ADVENT SEASON

During the season of Advent, blue vestments and altar hangings, given by a patron of the Cathedral, will be placed in use this year. The blue or deep blue of Advent recalls the penitential themes of Lent but is qualified by the overt and great joy we harbor in anticipation of Christ's first coming in Bethlehem. The emphasis on waiting in Advent has us sit with shepherds and wise men and Mary, all of whom wait and watch and wonder, often under the deep blue sky or by the light of the Star in the East.

Note: The history of the use of liturgical colors is wide, varied, and often quite local—particularly in the Episcopal Church and in the Church of England (see the Church Ordo as produced by Ashby). The Cathedral has largely followed the precedents of the Roman Catholic Church (inclusive of the use of purple and rose during Advent). But some pre- and post-Reformation traditions in the Church of England incorporated or provided for the use of blue during Advent. In recent times (mid-20th century on), some have believed that the use of blue in Advent helped the faithful reclaim and live into the variety of Advent themes implied by BCP prayers, holding them in tension with penitential characteristics of the season preserved in the practice of the Roman Catholic Church.

WEAPON-FREE POLICY

The Cathedral clergy and Vestry have declared the Cathedral to be a weapon-free place of worship, prayer, study, and fellowship, as a sign of Eucharistic peace. Please leave any weapons you are licensed to carry at home or in your car before entering the Cathedral grounds.
