## **LENTEN STUDY 2018**

During the Season of Lent, Christ Church Cathedral will offer two opportunities to study the writings of the Reverend Dr. Howard Thurman. Please join us for one or both and bring a friend! Howard Thurman was an African-American author, philosopher, theologian, educator, preacher, poet, and civil rights leader known for his ethical and cultural criticism. Thurman's theology of radical nonviolence shaped a generation of civil rights activists, including the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Thurman served as dean at Howard University and Boston University, and he co-founded the first major interracial, interdenominational church in the United States. His embrace of wisdom from other religious traditions, including Hinduism and Buddhism, emboldened interfaith cooperation and understanding. In his seminal work, *Jesus and the Disinherited*, Thurman provided an interpretation of the New Testament gospels that laid the foundation for a nonviolent civil rights movement.

Sundays, February 18, 25, and March 4, 11, and 18, the Dean's Forum will study 40-Day Journey with Howard Thurman.



"The 8th Deadly Sin"

Complication. Confusion. Disturbance. Diversion. That which calls our attention away. *Distraction* is the eighth deadly sin that distorts our relationships. *Distraction* exploits hairline cracks to make fissures between ourselves and other persons, crevasses between ourselves and all of creation, chasms between ourselves and God. What wolves come sneaking? What Strong Man beguiles us with flashy stories? How cold the iron of truths is, how unyielding, yet oddly pleasant—like the release of a fever. Such hard truths recalibrate us when we turn our attention to recall the freedom that God gives us to walk through this life. This freedom, a superpower really, is our best tool for engaging those tangled problems and fear-full challenges that tempt us to look away.
