



Chorus:

Break your bread with the hungry, and those who are in misery, take into your house! If you see someone naked, then clothe him, and do not recoil from your own flesh. And then your light will burst forth as the red dawn of morning, and your betterment will quickly grow, and your righteousness go before you, and the glory of the Lord will embrace you.

Recitativo (bass):

Recitativo (alto):

I have nothing but my spirit itself to offer to you; to my neighbor, the wish to be of service to him; to the poor, what you have given me in this life; and when it pleases you, my weak body to the earth.

I bring what I can, Lord; let it be pleasing to you, so that what you promise I might one day receive.

Chorale:

Blessed are those who, out of mercy, take on themselves the needs of others, are compassionate with the poor, plead faithfully for them to God. Those who are helpful with counsel, and, where possible, with deed, will receive help in return and obtain mercy.

Melanie Alvey

Combining a love of chamber music, composition and fusion of musical genres, the ensemble Avila Soul was cofounded by violinist and composer Melanie Alvey to specialize in contemporary music. Alvey completed undergraduate and masters degrees in Commercial Violin Performance at Belmont University. She is Chamber Ensemble Director for Music City Youth Orchestra and performs and arranges music for Nashville artists, including Dara Tucker, Lo Marie and Susan Benjey. The Nashville Composer Collective has performed five of her original compositions in its regular series.

Bach Double Orchestra Toni Ferguson

Bach Double Orchestra is an ad hoc group of area Suzuki students, teachers and professionals under the direction of Toni Ferguson, a professional violinist with over 30 years of teaching and performing experience. Mrs. Ferguson is the co-founder of the Suzuki Center of Nashville, on the faculty of the Overbrook School and St. Cecilia Academy. She has twice been awarded the Tennessee Governor's School Outstanding Teacher Award.

Denise Baker

Denise Baker has been a member of the Grammy Award winning Nashville Symphony Orchestra for over 20 seasons. A passionate proponent of the arts, Denise serves as co-concertmaster of the Nashville Philharmonic Orchestra. Her work also includes numerous recordings with commercial artists as well as cinematic scores and video games. She studied at the North Carolina School of the Arts with Elaine Richey.

Nick Bergin

Nick Bergin has served as the organist at First Presbyterian Church, Nashville, since 2012. He is a past Dean of the Nashville Chapter of the American Guild of Organists, and he currently edits the chapter newsletter. In addition to this, Nick plays a mean bagpipe and has an abiding love for the great outdoors.

Walter Bitner

Musician & writer, educator & administrator Walter Bitner is Director of Education & Community Engagement for the Nashville Symphony. Walter is a multi-instrumentalist, singer, and conductor; he directed performing arts programs at public and private schools in New York, Florida, and Nashville 1991-

2014; and he is Conductor Emeritus of Music City Youth Orchestra, which he founded and directed 2007-2012. He writes about music and education on his website Off The Podium at walterbitner.com.

Gregg Bunn

A native of Forsyth, Georgia, Dr. Gregg Bunn earned degrees in organ performance and church music from Shorter College, Indiana University, and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. Gregg has served churches in Georgia, Indiana, and Texas and has taught on the adjunct faculties of Dallas Baptist University, Mercer University's McAfee School of Theology and Belmont University. Currently, Gregg is the director of worship & arts and organist at Brentwood United Methodist Church.

Jennifer M. Coleman

Jennifer M. Coleman, mezzo soprano, has been described by critics as "having vocal power, and something to spare," and her performances as "affecting and eloquent." Jennifer toured with renowned accompanist John Wustman as a soloist in The Songs of Franz Schubert: A Seven-Year Cycle and has performed concert works with Monterey County Symphony and others. She is

currently professor of voice and vocal pedagogy at Belmont University.

Emily Hanna Crane

Violinist Emily Hanna Crane is the Coordinator of Orchestral Strings and Associate Professor of Music at Austin Peay State University, where she teaches violin, viola, chamber music, music appreciation, chamber music literature, and string methods. She also teaches Suzuki and traditional violin through the Community School of the Arts (Clarksville, Tenn.), where she received the Excellence in Teaching Award in 2010. Emily is an active adjudicator, clinician, and sectional coach for summer festivals, as well as honor and youth orchestras.

Matt Davich

Matt Davich is an active free-lance woodwind doubler, having played on TPAC shows, in Nashville Symphony and Nashville Jazz Orchestra concerts and recordings, recording sessions, and corporate and private events.

Patrick Dunnevant

Patrick Dunnevant is a composer, conductor, and baritone. In addition to serving as Portara Ensemble's Assistant Director, Patrick serves as a Coordinator with the Nashville Chamber Music Series, a collective dedicated to creating intimate performances of contemporary classical music in unconventional settings. He also serves as a section leader in the West End UMC Choir.

Kris Elsberry

Pianist Kris Elsberry, Professor of Music at Belmont University, has performed in Europe and throughout the United States. A founding member of and performer in Belmont Camerata, a resident faculty chamber music ensemble, she is

also a frequent collaborator with soloists. She has studied piano with Elizabeth Buday, Edward Kilenyi, Menahem Pressler, and Lynn Rice-See. In combining her studies in music theory and piano, Dr. Elsberry specializes in teaching musical form and the influence of analysis on performance.

Michael Gebhart

Michael Gebhart is the Assistant Organist and Choirmaster at Christ Church Cathedral, where he accompanies the Cathedral Choir and Cathedral Choristers in all services, and instructs the Junior Choristers. Michael holds the Bachelor of Music degree in Organ Performance from the Indiana University Jacobs School of Music where he also pursued a minor in Early Music with a concentration in harpsichord performance.

Patricia Gunter

Patricia Gunter was a member of the Nashville Symphony for 23 years. She currently freelances in Kentucky, Indiana, and Alabama and teaches bassoon at Tennessee State University. Ms. Gunter is a member of the Nashville Double Reed Ensemble and the instigator of the bassoon quintet, Bassoonery.

Teresa Hargrove

Teresa Hargrove (MM) is a freelance violinist and teacher.

Sam Levine

Sam Levine, leader and arranger, is a 3-time Dove Award nominee, band leader, studio musician and music contractor in Nashville. His saxophone, flute, penny whistle and clarinet playing can be heard on many recordings with artists as diverse as Garth Brooks, Amy Grant, Aaron Neville, Harry Connick Jr. and Lynyrd Skynyrd. He has recorded nine-

After study with both Marcel Grandjany and Mildred Dilling, she performed as symphonic, ballet and opera harpist in Louisville, New Orleans, Atlanta, and Glasgow, Scotland. Active as a recitalist, international competition adjudicator, collaborative musician, and composer, she is Area Representative for the Associated Board of the Royal Schools of Music.

Sandra Murray

Sandra Murray (MM) is a teacher and performer on piano, organ and harpsichord and currently chairperson of the Franklin Piano Guild.

Nashville Concerto Orchestra

Nashville Concerto Orchestra is a volunteer-based community orchestra that provides soloists, conductors, and orchestra members the opportunity to perform from the vast concerto repertoire. The NCO's free (donations accepted) quarterly concerts allow members of the Nashville community a chance to enjoy performances from members of the Nashville Symphony, local professors and students from Nashville's many colleges and universities, and session musicians from many of the hit albums recorded in Nashville, as well as providing amateur musicians with a com-

fortable place to perform as a part of an orchestra.

Nashville Philharmonic Orchestra

Nashville Philharmonic Orchestra is an all-volunteer community orchestra of amateur and professional musicians under the artistic direction of Dr. Christopher Norton. The NPO is dedicated to bringing symphonic music out of the concert hall and into neighborhoods in free performances. It has brought orchestral classics to over 20 different council districts in Davidson and surrounding counties in its 15-year history. Committed to supporting area musicians, it sponsors an annual conducting fellowship, composition and concerto competitions and features local soloists. Dr. Christopher Norton

Dr. Christopher Norton is Professor of Music and Director of Percussion Studies at Belmont University. He was appointed Music Director and Conductor of the Nashville Philharmonic in March 2008. He held a similar post for nearly a decade in Kentucky with the Bowling Green Western Symphony Orchestra. Dr. Norton has guest conducted the Nashville Symphony, Alabama Symphony, Nashville Chamber Orchestra, Nashville Ballet, ALIAS Chamber Ensemble, Vanderbilt Orchestra, and Blair Chamber Orchestra. Norton earned his doctorate from Louisiana State University, and his MM and BM from the Eastman School of Music. An active performer, he is a member of the Nashville Symphony Orchestra.

Matthew Phelps

Matthew Phelps is the Minister of Music at West End United Methodist Church, and an active conductor, pianist, and organist. A member of the Elliston Trio, Dr. Phelps has performed in solo and chamber music recitals throughout the area. He received his doctorate in conducting from the College Conservatory of Music in Cincinnati and is on the faculty of Lipscomb University.

Portara Ensemble

Portara Ensemble has quickly become a creative force in the music scene of Middle Tennessee. Their innovative programming and artist collaborations have crossed the boundaries of visual and performing arts and brought exciting new music to their audiences. Led by Artistic Director Jason Shelton, Portara Ensemble's thought-provoking thematic choral programs explore a wide variety of music from around the globe sung by professional, semi-professional, and amateur volunteer singers.

Sari Reist is a member of Alias Chamber Ensemble. She plays with the Nashville Opera Orchestra, is a studio session cellist and teaches at Blair School of Music.

Anne Marie Padelford Robidoux holds degrees in Piano Performance and German from Belmont University, an MM in Collaborative Piano from the University of North Carolina School of the Arts, and a Master of Arts Management degree from Carnegie Mellon University. Chamber Orchestra. formance from Shorter University and the MCM and DMA in piano and music history from the School of Church Music of The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. He has served as Belmont's Carillonneur since 1986, and he has performed regularly on the harpsichord with Belmont's faculty chamber ensemble, Belmont Camerata, and the Belmont University Symphony Orchestra. In addition, he serves as organist at Immanuel Baptist Church. He recently completed Music on the Beautiful Mountain which chronicles the history of music at Belmont from the time of Adelicia Acklen to the present.

Wilson Sharpe

Wilson Sharpe is a freelance bassoonist and retired band director from Murfreesboro, TN. Wilson has a BS from the University of Tennessee and did graduate studies at Ohio State University with Chris Weait. Mr. Sharpe is presently a member of the Murfreesboro Symphony Orchestra, a former member of the Chattanooga Symphony and the 129th Army National Guard Band in Nashville.

Samantha Schrecker

Samantha Schrecker began harp study at the age of six. Winner of First Prize in both the 2014 Wales International Junior Harp Competition and the 2014 Kentucky-Tennessee Classical Harp Competition, this Thor Johnson Scholarship prizewinner is Principal Harp of the Curb Youth Symphony. She holds a Diploma in Harp Performance from the Royal Schools of Music, London.

Harold Skelton

Harold Skelton performs with various professional and volunteer ensembles around Nashville including Nashville Double Reed Ensemble, Trevecca Symphony Orchestra, Murfreesboro Symphony, and Nashville Wind Ensemble. His day gig is as a lead product development engineer for Whirlpool Corporation.

Elisabeth Small

Violinist Elisabeth Small is Assistant Professor of Music and Coordinator of Strings at Belmont University and Artistic Director of Belmont's String Crossing Camp for high school string players. She serves as Artistic Director of Belmont Camerata, the resident faculty chamber ensemble.
