




The Old Testament Lesson – Isaiah 11:1-5





Nicene Creed (BCP p. 358)

All stand.






The Celebrant proceeds

The Celebrant continues

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all. He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,







The Reverend Colenzo J. Hubbard



The Reverend Colenzo J. Hubbard is the founder and executive director of the Emmanuel Center, Inc., an urban outreach ministry in Memphis, Tennessee. In September 2019, the Reverend Hubbard began his 31st year as executive director. When it was established in September 1989, the primary focus of this ministry was evangelism, education, social services, community relations, job training and placement and sports for the children and adults living in the public housing developments and surrounding community. In recent years, the public housing has been replaced by affordable housing, yet there is still a need for this vital ministry in the underserved community.

The Reverend Hubbard is a graduate of the University of Alabama, where he was a member of the world-renowned Omega Psi Phi fraternity and graduated with a degree in social work. He was also a member of the Crimson Tide football team, coached by Paul "Bear" Bryant, that won the 1973 national championship and three SEC championships. After graduation, he went to work for Ryder Systems, Truck Rental Division. During his 8½ year career there, he specialized in management, sales, marketing, and administration, and rose to the rank of district rental manager, covering most of the state of Alabama.

He answered the call to ministry and was ordained deacon in 1986 and priest in 1987 in the Episcopal Diocese of Alabama. The Reverend Hubbard is a fourth-generation clergyman.

He was the founding vicar of St. Joseph's Episcopal Church in Memphis, Tennessee, which was established in 1992 as a result of the evangelistic outreach of the Emmanuel Center. Additionally, from 1999 to 2004, he was vicar of St. Paul Episcopal Church in Memphis, accepting the call in 2004 as rector of Church of the Redeemer in Germantown, Tennessee (2004-2010). He continues to serve as the founding vicar of St. Joseph Episcopal Church and for the past nine years has been the vicar of Emmanuel Episcopal Church.

The Reverend Hubbard serves on the boards of many organizations in the Memphis area. He is a founding board member of Promise Academy Charter Schools in Memphis and a founding board member of Memphis Opportunity Scholarship Trust (M.O.S.T.), a non-profit organization providing scholarships for youth to attend private schools throughout the Shelby County, Tennessee, area.

In recognition of his efforts to serve the underserved and assist children in reaching their God-given potential, four full high-school scholarships have been established in his name at the prestigious St. Andrews-Sewanee boarding school in Sewanee, Tennessee.

The Reverend Hubbard received the State of Alabama Governor's Award for Outstanding Religious and Community Service; the Toastmasters International Communication and Leadership Award; the Carnival Memphis Cook-Halle Award for leadership as a non-profit executive; the Thomas W. Briggs Award for outstanding community service; the Amateur Football Award from the Memphis Chapter of the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame; the Christian Brothers University Bishop Carroll T. Dozier Award for Peace and Justice; the Henry Logan Starks Distinguished Service Award from Memphis Theological Seminary; and the Paul "Bear" Bryant Alumni-Athlete Award, given by the University of Alabama and recognizing former UA athletes and students whose accomplishments have been outstanding based on character, contributions to society, professional achievement, and service. The Memphis Grizzlies professional basketball organization honored the Reverend Hubbard's humanitarian efforts in the Memphis community, and most recently he received the University of Memphis chapter of the NAACP Freedom Award for Religion.

The Reverend Hubbard has been elected to represent the Episcopal Diocese of West Tennessee as deputy to the General Convention for the past eight conventions, most recently as Deputy #1. He has served as co-chairperson of the National Standing Commission on Domestic Mission and Evangelism and was the special representative of the president of the House of Deputies to that Commission. He was appointed to the 2012 General Convention Committee on Small Churches and most recently served on the National Church Committee on Alleviating Poverty. He has served as president and vice president of the Diocesan Clergy Clericus and has served several terms on the Diocesan governing body of Bishop and Council.

In May 2016 the Reverend Hubbard received a Certificate of Advanced Pastoral Leadership from his beloved seminary, Trinity School for Ministry in Ambridge, Pennsylvania. He returned there as a guest preacher to speak on the legacy of the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. on the 50th anniversary of his assassination.

After they were both widowed, Colenzo and LaVerne met at the Episcopal Conference Center at Kanuga, North Carolina, and again at the 2006 General Convention of the Episcopal Church in Columbus, Ohio. They married in November 2007 and recently celebrated their 12th anniversary. They have four adult children and one granddaughter and live in Cordova, Tennessee.
